

Harvard Call Summary:

(b)(6)(b)(7)(C)CBP HQ, facilitated a call between the On Boston Field Office and (b)(6)(b)(7)(C) staff regarding concerns surrounding the refusal of travelers who were attending (b)(6)(b)(7)(C) as students. CBP management began by explaining that CBP has a complex mission at our ports of entry to deter and prevent terrorist and terrorist weapons, prevent illicit drugs, agricultural pests, and contraband while facilitating and expediting the flow of legitimate travelers and trade. It was explained that in order to do this, everyone who arrives at a US port of entry is subject to inspection. During the primary process, the CBP officer will ask questions such as citizenship, purpose of trip, declaration and that fingerprints and photos would be taken. When determination of immigration status is unable to be accomplished by the primary officer and is subject to further review or if the traveler is applying for an immigration benefit, then they will be sent to secondary. It was emphasized and explained that applicants for admission bear the burden of proof to establish that they are clearly eligible to enter the United States and that in order to demonstrate that they are admissible, they applicant must overcome all grounds of inadmissibility. The grounds of inadmissibility were generally outlined into major categories including health related, prior criminal convictions, security reasons, public charge, illegal entrants and immigration violations, documentation requirements, and miscellaneous grounds. Area Port Director (b)(6)(b)(7)(C) then explained processing specific to the Boston Logan International Airport. She also explained that when an individual is granted a visa, it only allows them to apply for admission, and that the visa does not guarantee admission into the United States. She explained that students are sent to admissibility secondary to review their SEVIS package, status, and baggage examination. Based on the totality of the inspection, a decision is made by the officer if the applicant is admissible or inadmissible. If inadmissible, they may choose to withdraw their application and return once they have the proper documentation. If it is determined that they are not admissible, based on certain factors, they may be subject to an Expedited Removal.

officials explained that over the past 18 months, 4 students have been denied entry within the Boston Field Office. They asked what percentage of the other agency reviews do we take into account when determining whether a person can enter the US (i.e. DoS review during visa application). It was explained that the State Department information is taken into account, but the information is only as good as what the student provides during the visa interview and application process. On occasion during the course of the CBP inspection upon arrival information that was provided to DOS in order to obtain the visa found to be was inaccurate or false. (b)(6)(b)(7)(C) asked if the students are provided the reason for denial into the country and if it is on the documentation that they are provided. It was explained that anyone who is denied entry is told the reason and given a copy of the sworn statement. (b)(6)(b)(7)(C) then questioned whether or not the "7A1" charge - intended immigrant" was a catch all phrase. They said this was new to them and in the last 18 months they had never seen it used. They stated that they understood if it was a national security related denial; however, the paperwork only states "7A1 intended immigrant" and if there was any way to find out and asked if they could assist CBP with determining whether or not an applicant is indeed a student at (b)(6)(b)(7)(C) We explained that there are multiple reviews on determining if an applicant is inadmissible and that CBP

Boston currently conducts outreach with International Student Advisors at numerous universities, to include (b)(6)(b)(7)(C) asked if we use a 7A charge if it is a national security issue. [b](6)(6)(7)(C) replied that the notification for all recent cases was good except for the latest one in which they were not notified until the next morning. A review of the case indicated that the port contacted a "friend" of the subject at her request.

We asked for their assistance with messaging to their J1s/research personnel to declare their biological items and to obtain proper documentation from other agencies prior to entering the US. Information was provided on how to obtain requirements.

Stated that if one of their researchers did not declare those types of items, that they wouldn't question our decision on those types of incidents. They then asked what would be helpful for them to tell the students about social media. We said to be open and honest when questioned by a CBP officer. They also asked if all students were given the option to withdraw their application. It was explained that not all applicants are offered that option. If we encounter grounds that warrant expedited removal, then that is the course of action taken.

CBP reiterated that we do not take these decisions lightly. We understand that these decisions are life changing and explained why we have multiple review processes in place. [0](6)(6)(7)(G) was thankful for the open communication and asked for specific points of contact, which will be provided. We agreed to contact them when needed. They will be participating in the next port tour at Boston Logan next week intended for International Student Advisors.

The protest at Logan Airport grew to approximately 25-50 individuals.

Immigration attorneys on site at Logan Airport presented CBP with a document requesting a Writ of Habeas Corpus to have (b)(6)(b)(7)(C) released from custody.

CBP OCC engaged the U.S. Attorney's Office and determined that although the Writ of Habeas Corpus was filed with the court, the court did not issue any order or notice to CBP barring the agency from removing (b)(6)(b)(7)(C) ABADI.

(b)(6)(b)(7)(C) was escorted to the departure gate and boarded on Air France flight 333.

Air France flight 333 pushed back at 2134 hours. The flight was wheels up at 2156 hours destined to Paris, France wit (b)(6)(b)(7)(C) on board.

The story has gained local media attention with multiple TV outlets and social media sites incorrectly reporting that (b)(6)(b)(7)(C) was not removed and will be in court tomorrow.

During the course of the protest the participants remained peaceful and no issues were encountered.

Senator Edward Markey along with members of his staff contacted CBP and was provided with the standard response and advised that (b)(6)(b)(7)(C) had departed the United States.
