## Boston Logan Airport: Refusal of F1 Student attending a fraudulent Optional Practical Training (OPT) Program

(b)(6), (b)(7)(C)

On (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) Boston CBP Officers encountered a citizen of China traveling on an F1 visa who was attending a fraudulent OPT program. The subject was referred to Admissibility secondary. During the inspection, the subject was attending (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) as a Masters candidate and had previously completed 3 years of OPT. In 2018 the subject “transferred” to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and was immediately accepted into and OPT program. (b)(7)(E) revealed the subject’s employment authorization ended in July 2018. The subject is currently employed as a software engineer for Google in Cambridge, MA and Google previously sponsored at least two H1B visa applications which were denied. The subject admitted under oath that his manager at Google suggested he attend (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to keep working at Google and maintain status. Subject was refused under 212(a)(7)(A)(i)(I). (b)(7)(E)

On (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) Boston CBP Officers encountered a citizen of India traveling on a F1 visa to attend a fraudulent school, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). The subject stated that he studies Customer Service and attends courses twice a week for a total of ten (10) hours. The subject also admitted under oath to working at a pizza shop. The subject was refused admission for violating the terms of the F1 visa by not engaging in a full time course of study and engaging in unauthorized employment. Subject was refused under 212(a)(7)(A)(i)(I) (b)(7)(E)

**Citizen of Serbia traveling on an F-1 Visa refused admission for attending fraudulent school to obtain OPT and continue working in the United States.**

On (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) Boston CBP Officers encountered a subject traveling on an F1 visa. The subject was referred to Admissibility secondary for an inspection. During the inspection the subject admitted under oath that she had previously graduated from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and completed OPT. The subject later applied and enrolled at the (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). The subject stated she was looking for a school that allowed fulltime OPT and more importantly OPT from day one. The subject did not have a valid I-765 on December 2, 2019. The subject was processed as an Expedited Removal under Section 212(a)(7)(A)(i)(I). (b)(7)(E)

## Boston Logan: Refusal of a Citizen of India and F1 Visa Holder for Attending a Fraudulent School and Obtaining Employment Outside the Scope of the Degree of Study on Optional Practical Training (OPT).

On (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) CBP Officers encountered a (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) year old (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) citizen of India applying for admission into the United States on a valid F1 visa. The subject was referred to Admissibility Secondary for inspection. It was determined that the subject was attending (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) a known fraud school with an alleged "pay to stay" OPT program. The subject stated under oath that she obtained a masters degree in Electrical Engineering but could not answer basic questions about the principles of electricity or electrical engineering. The subject stated that she was working as an I.T. Specialist at a company called (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). The subject stated that she was qualified to work in this field after taking three (3) credit courses. The subject was allowed to withdraw her application for admission in lieu of expedited removal and after being found inadmissible und INA Sec 212(a)(7)(A)(i)(I). One (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) CBP Officers encountered a (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) year old (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) citizen of India applying for admission into the United States on a valid F1 visa. The subject was referred to Admissibility Secondary for inspection. It was determined that the subject was attending (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) a known fraud school with an alleged “pay to stay” OPT program. The subject previously completed a Master’s degree program at the (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and had completed OPT through (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) working at (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). The employment authorization for that OPT program ended in (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). The subject then applied to the (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to obtain a certificate as a Customer Service Specialist. The subject began OPT training with (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) at the same time as enrolling at (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). The subject was deemed inadmissible to the United States under 212(a)(7)(A)(i)(I) and was processed for an expedited removal. (b)(7)(E)

~~determine subject's military history and to further~~ research previous visa refusal under Section 212(a)(3)(A)(i) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA). At conclusion of secondary exam, subject was found to be inadmissible to the U.S. pursuant to Section 212(a)(7)(A)(i)(I) of the INA and was processed as an expedited removal, subject expressed **(b)(7)(E)** during processing and will remain in custody pending his hearing.

During interview subject indicated in 2010, he previously worked under the rank of Lieutenant at an Air Force facility on a special project for 3-4 months. Subject indicated he was selected through the Air Force to model and reverse engineer a welding machine that had military applications; he would not elaborate on its use. The subject was very evasive throughout secondary interview, when probed further he provided geo-coordinates of the location in which he worked on the project and googled: (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) indicating that was the name of where he worked on the project, subject inadvertently went onto the website

Subject was processed as an expedited removal, subject expressed (b)(7)(E) during processing and will remain at Logan Airport until (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) in which time he will be transferred to ERO custody pending his hearing.

Based on our quick review of (b)(7)(E) pertaining to this case, this subject was with our admissibility enforcement unit on January 11, 2017 through January 13, 2017 when he was turned over to ICE ERO for further processing. Then again on (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) the subject was brought back to AEU for additional questioning relating to his original claim.

The timeline looks like this:

- (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) - Subject in custody for ER proceedings
- (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) - ER Case Completed (last day with OFO)
- (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) - Transferred to Barracks 5 Detention Facility

- (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) - Returned to San Ysidro AEU to amend his statement. Subject was offered a withdrawal in lieu of removal, but refused so the ER was continued.

His name is (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and he is a Tunisian national who has been living and studying in the U.S. for the past three years on a F-1 visa.

Over the winter break (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) vacationed in Baja, Mexico and upon returning to the United States on (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was detained and taken to secondary processing. We were informed that his attorney, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) has been having difficulties getting information about her client's case and the reason he is being detained. She has been told by both CBP and ICE officials to speak with the other agency about her client's status.

CBP officials did inform (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) lawyer that he would be receiving expedited removal. When pressed, officials said that someone from CBP had spoken with West LA College's International Student Office and was told that (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)'s I-20 was out of status. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) the International Student Coordinator of the college is the only person authorized to speak about a student's I-20 status, and he confirmed to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) that he had not spoken to any officials and in fact was out of the office of (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). Also, on (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was allegedly taken to the San Ysidro Port of Entry and asked to sign voluntary removal order without notifying his attorney.

Our office understands CBP is doing their best to ensure an effective and efficient border-crossing process. But we respectfully request an update on the status of (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) the reason for his on-going detention, and a time certain that he can meet with his lawyer to determine the best course of action that may permit him to return to his studies at (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)
