INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS (IPR)

Action Required: Informational

Background:

- The Commercial Customs Operations Advisory Committee (COAC), through the Intelligent Enforcement Subcommittee Intellectual Property Rights Working Group (IPRWG), provides advice and recommendations on improving intellectual property rights (IPR) enforcement.
- At the February 27, 2019 COAC public meeting the advisory committee voted on six recommendations that were developed by the IPR Working Group (IPRWG) to address current challenges in IPR enforcement.
- CBP is currently working within the IPRWG to explore and work through these recommendations, which cover the following topics:
 - 1. Additional Data Elements and Metrics
 - 2. Small Package Concerns
 - 3. Automation Needs
 - 4. Regulatory Changes
 - 5. Donation Acceptance Program
 - 6. eRecordation
- CBP is developing an IPR blockchain proof of concept to test the use of the technology for both facilitation
 and IPR enforcement purposes. In March, CBP held an IPR blockchain workshop to define the scope of the
 proof of concept and determine the private sector participation. This two day workshop included
 representatives from both the trade community and CBP.
- Currently the group is meeting weekly to discuss the technical requirements and develop the engineering plan necessary for the testing phase. The information gained from these weekly discussions will be used to run the proof of concept, which is scheduled to begin in mid to late summer.

Issues and Next Steps:

- CBP and the IPRWG members are currently discussing potential areas where automation of CBP's
 processes may be most beneficial for the processing of small packages and discussing CBP's recordation
 process and systems.
- CBP will provide further briefings with IPRWG members on CBP's implementation of the E-Commerce Strategy.
