

It's not a direction to stop communicating with the media altogether.

Whenever possible, media inquiries should be directed to me as the Public Affairs Liaison so that I can track them and ensure consistency in forwarding them to the DHS Office of Public Affairs. In the event I'm not available, please direct the media to the DHS OPA at the info below and send me an email letting me know the circumstances (name of media organization, name of requestor, contact info). Not so confusing after all!

WMUR reports Dubai Airports, the owner and manager of Dubai International Airport, said it is "monitoring the situation" after the U.S. imposed a temporary travel ban on seven countries. It directed customers with questions on the new visa policies to the U.S. CBP website or their booking agent.

Jamaicaobserver.com - Caribbean illegal migrants nabbed by US authorities

Jamaica Observer reports CBP agency says law enforcement authorities have intercepted 126 undocumented migrants from the Dominican Republic, Cuba and Haiti in four separate events since January 20. The CBP said working under the Caribbean Border Interagency Group (CBIG), 30 of the migrants with prior immigration or criminal records will be prosecuted for attempting to re-enter the U.S.

ABC Newsgo.com - 6 Dead, 8 Injured in 'Terrorist Attack on Muslims' at Quebec City Mosque

ABC News reports two suspects are in custody after a shooting at a mosque in Quebec City left six people dead and eight injured, officials said early Monday. Quebec City police confirmed to ABC News that the two suspects being held are men in their 20s. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau called the shooting a "terrorist attack on Muslims," and offered his condolences.

Fox News.com - House Dems demand meeting with DHS chief over Trump travel ban

Fox New reports Top House Democrats have demanded an emergency meeting with DHS Secretary John Kelly to get clarification over President Donald Trump's immigration restrictions, which have been a source of controversy since they were put into action late last week. Democrats on the judiciary, homeland security and foreign affairs oversight committees wrote a joint letter to Kelly "to discuss the implementation and guidance concerning the Executive Order."

Time.com - White House Defends Implementation of President Trump's Refugee, Visa Order

Time reports responding to confusion and outcry over President Donald Trump's executive order Friday suspending the U.S. refugee program and banning travelers from seven countries, the White House heaped praise on U.S. bureaucrats for their swift implementation of the order. The Friday order suspends the U.S. refugee assistance program for 120 days and bans visa entries from Iraq, Syria, Sudan, Iran, Somalia, Yemen, and Libya unless a case-by-case waiver is granted for 90 days. Several people covered by the order were detained on arrival in the U.S. late Friday and early Saturday, while others were removed from airplanes overseas.

Reuters.com - Tens of thousands in U.S. cities protest Trump immigration policies

Reuters reports Jan 29 Tens of thousands of people rallied in U.S. East Coast cities on Sunday afternoon to protest President Donald Trump's executive order that blocked entry into the country for travelers from seven Muslim-majority nations. In New York, Washington and Boston, a second wave of demonstrations began after spontaneous rallies at many airports on Saturday, when CBPO's began enforcing the president's directive.

National Law Review.com - CBP Issues Notice of Delay of Effective Date for Amendment to CBP Regulations Regarding TSCA Import Certifications

National Law Review reports on January 27, 2017, the CBP issued in the Federal Register a notice of delay of an effective date of a final rule issued on December 27, 2016 (81 Fed. Reg. 94980). The final rule announced amendments to CBP regulations regarding the requirement to file a Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA) certification when importing into the customs territory of the United States chemicals in bulk form or as part of mixtures and articles containing a chemical or mixture. 82 Fed. Reg. 8590. Specifically, the final rule amends CBP's regulations under 19 C.F.R. Parts 12 and 127 to establish an electronic option for importers to file the required U.S.

Roll Call.com - Search for Billions to Pay for Border Wall Confronts

Roll Call reports Republican leaders said Thursday they plan to pony up \$12 billion to \$15 billion in the coming months to begin construction of President Donald Trump's proposed border wall, but that large sum of money may be just the first installment to fund a project that could cost taxpayers as much as \$40 billion, according to some independent estimates. In addition, Republicans face likely opposition not just from Democrats but also centrist Republicans and fiscal hawks who would balk at seeing that kind of tab added on to the deficit. Travis Hall, a spokesman for the House Republican Study Committee, said the conservative group will insist on offsets, as it has with supplemental appropriations in the past.

CNBC.com - Sources: DHS temporarily halts trips by staff to interview refugees abroad

CNBC reports DHS temporarily halted trips by staff to interview refugees abroad as it prepares for a likely shakeup of refugee policy by President Donald Trump, two sources with knowledge of the decision said on Thursday. The decision effectively amounts to a pause in future refugee admissions, given that the interviews are a crucial step in an often years-long process.

<u>The National Law Review.com</u> - New Trump Executive Order to Suspend Entry of Persons from Certain Countries Expected

The National Law Review reports "Protecting the Nation from Terrorist Attacks by Foreign Nationals" is expected to be the next Executive Order on immigration from the Trump Administration. This Order is intended to "protect the American people from terrorist attacks" and "ensure that those admitted into our country do not bear hostile attitudes toward our country and its founding principles."

According to CBP, the average processing time on Saipan this week has been 37 minutes," Kilili said.

RGV Proud reports CBPO Gerardo Yzaguirre who was working at the Veterans International Bridge helped save the life of a traveler suffering from cardiac arrest. "Officer Gerardo Yzaguirre's prompt action played a key role in the survival of the traveler," said Port Director Petra Horne, "Our officers involved did an outstanding job working as a team to assist the traveler in need of immediate medical attention."

How formal/informal, etc.?: There does not currently exist regular formal scheduled administrative communication between the IBC and U.S. Border Patrol in Blaine, Washington. However, the agencies are familiar enough about each other's mission, there is communication whenever one agency's work may impact the other. An example would be when the IBC is going to perform maintenance or brush clearing on the border the IBC would contact Blaine Sector and/or station leadership and let them know they will be working in the area at a particular place and time. This information would be passed down to the agents in the field so they are aware of this activity on or near the border.

CBP Officers Discover Man is Wanted for Homicide

SAN DIEGO — U.S. Customs and Border Protection officers working at the San Ysidro port of entry Wednesday discovered a man was wanted for homicide by the San Diego County Sherriff's Office.

On Jan. 25, at about 7:45 p.m., Mexican officials escorted a man to the San Ysidro pedestrian border crossing, Ped West. A CBP officer ran a fingerprint query of law enforcement databases and discovered a possible match for an active outstanding felony warrant for his arrest.

CBP officers confirmed the man's identity as 30-year-old Jorge Ibarra, a U.S. citizen, and that he was the subject of an outstanding warrant for homicide. The warrant was issued at the request of the San Diego County Sheriff's Department with bail set at \$1 million.

Ibarra was transferred to the custody of U.S. Deputy Marshals and booked into the San Diego Central Jail.

Time reports responding to confusion and outcry over President Donald Trump's executive order Friday suspending the U.S. refugee program and banning travelers from seven countries, the White House heaped praise on U.S. bureaucrats for their swift implementation of the order. The Friday order suspends the U.S. refugee assistance

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program for 120 days and bans visa entries from Iraq, Syria, Sudan, Iran, Somalia, Yemen, and Libya unless a case-by-case waiver is granted for 90 days. Several people covered by the order were detained on arrival in the U.S. late Friday and early Saturday, while others were removed from airplanes overseas.

The final rule announced amendments to CBP regulations regarding the requirement to file a Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA) certification when importing into the customs territory of the United States chemicals in bulk form or as part of mixtures and articles containing a chemical or mixture. 82 Fed. Reg. 8590. Specifically, the final rule amends CBP's regulations under 19 C.F.R. Parts 12 and 127 to establish an electronic option for importers to file the required U.S.

Roll Call reports Republican leaders said Thursday they plan to pony up \$12 billion to \$15 billion in the coming months to begin construction of President Donald Trump's proposed border wall, but that large sum of money may be just the first installment to fund a project that could cost taxpayers as much as \$40 billion, according to some independent estimates. In addition, Republicans face likely opposition not just from Democrats but also centrist Republicans and fiscal hawks who would balk at seeing that kind of tab added on to the deficit. Travis Hall, a spokesman for the House Republican Study Committee, said the conservative group will insist on offsets, as it has with supplemental appropriations in the past.

The exemption process for other categories of aliens as outlined in the policy guidance currently requires the approval of the acting Commissioner. Effective immediately, and pursuant to Executive Order entitled, "Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States" (January 27, 2017), all entry into the United States for aliens who are nationals from Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen is hereby suspended in accordance with Section 212(f) of the INA. This includes all non-immigrant classifications, with the exception of those foreign nationals traveling on diplomatic visas, NATO visas, C2 visas for travel to the United Nations, G1, G2, G-3, and G-4 visas. This also includes all immigrant classes of admission, returning resident aliens refugees and asylees.

The Department to State has provided CBP with a letter provisionally revoking all immigrant and non-immigrant visas for nationals of Iran, Iran, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, and Yemen. Revocations may not yet be annotated in the system.

Should aliens, subject to the Executive Order, arrive at the port of entry, CBP officers are instructed to take the following actions:

Applicants bearing Non-Immigrant Visas and First Time Arriving Immigrants:

- (1) All case processing will be recorded in system, according to current policy/procedure.

 (b)(7)(E)
- (2) Subjects will be allowed to withdraw their application for admission on Form I-275, *without a sworn statement*. All other procedures pertaining to the processing of Form I-275 withdrawal cases apply.
- (3) Should the alien decline to withdraw their application for admission, the alien will be placed in Expedited Removal in accordance with standard operating procedures.
- (4) Aliens claiming fear of return will be referred to an asylum officer, and processed for Expedited Removal/Credible Fear (ERF). Aliens processed under ERF procedures will be referred to ERO for detention. Field Offices should clearly indicate to both CIS and ERO that aliens are subject to Executive Order during the referral process.

Returning Residents,

(1) Lawful Permanent Residents should be referred for (b)(7)(E) and held at the port of entry until an exemption to the Executive Order is granted. The authority to grant an exemption has been delegated to the Commissioner of CBP, and further delegated to Directors of Field Operations and SES Port Directors. Once an exemption has been granted results of (b)(7)(E) should be notated in (b)(7)(E) with the following language: Individual is subject to Presidential Executive Order and barred from entry pursuant to 212(f) of the INA but has been granted an exemption per (insert DFO/SES PD).
Refugees, Asylees, Unaccompanied Children, and subjects returning to the US with Advanced Parole: (1) Aliens from the above group who are prevented from entry solely as a result of the Executive Order, should be referred for (b)(7)(E) and held at the port of entry until such time as an exemption to the Executive Order can be obtained. This exemption falls to the Secretary of State and Secretary of Homeland Security. Further guidance will be forthcoming on processing these exemptions.
Individuals who fall within any of the above may not be paroled, which includes port parole and deferred inspection. To the extent that there is an emergent medical issue related to an alien who falls within the Executive Order, CBP officers must accompany the alien for any medical care.
Returning aliens ineligible who withdraw their application for admission: (1) Aliens arriving via air or sea: Commercial carriers are required to remove foreign aliens found ineligible for entry under this order pursuant to 241(c)(1) of the INA. (2) Aliens arriving via land will be returned per current established procedures with the contiguous country.






