For any alien currently in CBP custody who had previously been processed for Expedited Removal and not yet removed, please re-process according to this guidance. For any questions regarding this guidance please contact Admissibility and Passenger Programs, duty officer.

January 29, 2017 Update:

Baltimore Field Office:

Washington-Dulles International Airport (IAD)

- Protests are larger than yesterday numbering approximately 300 people.
- Protestors displayed signs and chanted.
- Protests are peaceful and protestors have not entered the FIS.
- Loudoun County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) and the Airports Authority Police are in the area and control has been maintained throughout the day.



Philadelphia International Airport (PHL)

- Protests began at 1433 hours (EST) outside of Terminal "A" East and West but have now begin to disperse.
- Protests were peaceful and protestors did not enter the FIS.
- No impact to airport operations.

Austin-Bergstrom International Airport (AUS)

- Approximately 200 protestors gathered at 1445 hours (CST) and dispersed at 1715 hours.
- The protest was peaceful.

- No impact to operations.

Houston-Bush Intercontinental Airport (IAH)

- Protests began at approximately 1340 hours (CST) in Terminal E right outside of the FIS arrival area.
- Approximately 30-60 protestors chanted, clapped, and held signs while travelers exited the FIS.
- The Houston Police Department (HPD) was on site with 15-20 officers.
- Protests were peaceful and protestors did not enter the FIS.

San Antonio International Airport (SAT)

- Protests began at approximately 1215 hours (CST) in the Terminal "A" baggage claim with three protestors and one counter protestor.
- Local media and Univision Spanish Network filmed the event and then departed the area.
- All protestors departed the area at 1530 hours.
- No impact to operations.



Miami Field Office:

Miami International Airport (MIA)

- Protests began around 1400 hours (EST) on the second level of the airport.
- The Miami Dade Police Department estimated the crowd to be 150 protestors.
- No impact to operations.

Orlando International Airport (MCO)

- Protests have begun and include approximately 300 protestors.
- The Orlando Police Department (OPD) is containing the protestors inside the food court of the main terminal.
- No impact to operations.

Fort Lauderdale International Airport (FLL)

- Protests have begun on a grassy area next to a parking garage across from Terminal 4.
- There are approximately 20-25 protestors who are holding signs.
- The Broward County Sheriff's Office and Broward County Airport Division (BCAD) security personnel are on site monitoring the protest.
- Local media was on site.
- No impact to operations.

New Orleans Field Office:

Louis Armstrong International Airport (KMSY)

- Protests began at approximately 1600 hours outside of the baggage claim area with 25-30 protestors.
- The protest was peaceful as protestors held up a banner, sang, and chanted but did not enter the FIS.
- The Jefferson Parish Sheriff's Office is on site monitoring the protest.
- Local media is also onsite.
- No impact to operations.

Tucson Field Office

Phoenix Sky Harbor Airport (PHX)

- Protests began at 1440 hours (MST) outside Terminal 4 Level 2.
- The number of protestors is undetermined as the protest is not near the FIS.
- Phoenix Police Department (PPD) is monitoring the protest.
- No impact to operations at this time.

SYNOPSIS:

On January 28, 2017, various U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) ports of entry (POEs) are reporting protests resulting from the Executive Order (EO) "Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States" issued by President Trump on January 27, 2017. This EO suspended all entry into the United States for aliens who are nationals from Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen as per Section 212(f) of the INA. This includes all non-immigrant classifications, with the exception of those people traveling on diplomatic visas, NATO visas, C2 visas going to the United Nations, G1, G2, G3 and G4 visas. The order also includes all immigrant classes of admission, returning resident aliens, refugees and asylees.

DETAILS:

New York Field Office:

John F. Kennedy International Airport (JFK)

UPDATE #2:

- As of 2135 hours, JFK Terminal 4 is reporting that the crowds of protesters are decreasing at this time.
-

UPDATE #1:

- As of 1900 hours, protestors have occupied the parking garage at Terminal 4 (all levels) with signs.
 - Crowd estimate is approximately 2,500-3,000. Demonstration mainly contained to Terminal 4 at this time, sporadic protesters at all the other terminals. PAPD, National Guard, state police, and NYPD assets will be deployed to all terminals.
 - The protesters are being contained, are peaceful, are keeping their distance and are being closely monitored.
 - Air Train service is restricted, only ticketed passengers and persons with airport ID will be allowed to enter the air train to access the central terminal areas.
 - No impact to airport operations.
-
- According to the NY/NJ Port Authority Police Department (PAPD), a group of demonstrators (about 80) are currently protesting in a parking lot outside Terminal 4 under the presence of media outlets.
 - With assistance of PAPD and Port Authority (PA) operations we have directed the protesters to remain in a specific lot where they are currently staged and monitored.
 - The PAPD Police closed inner arrivals roadways to all traffic with exception police vehicles, and yellow cabs. Some arrivals doorways also have been restricted by PAPD at this time, and all arrivals foot traffic has been directed to specific exit doors.

- The remaining 4 CBP terminals at JFK have not been impacted. The PAPD are making sure media personnel are not congregating in the terminals.
- A conference call with PAPD was held at 1500 hours and the JFK Port Director briefed the other law enforcement agencies on how CBP is processing the passengers who are subject to this EO.
- Due to the demonstration scheduled to take place in the Terminal 4 parking lot at 1830 hours, additional police personnel will be deployed to the area to ensure that the demonstration remains peaceful.
- Approximately 350-400 demonstrators are currently in the east side of the parking lot.



Newark-Liberty International Airport (EWR)

- A group of protestors have congregated at the Terminal B International Arrivals Area of Newark Liberty International Airport.
- The crowd size is approximately 100 and the protest is peaceful.
- Several media outlets have set up around the protest. The group is protesting the implementation of President Trump's Executive Order.
- PAPD is securing the area for travelers and airport employees.



Baltimore Field Office:

Washington-Dulles International Airport (IAD)

- Virginia Governor Terry McAuliffe and Virginia Attorney General Mark Herring attend a "Protest Rally To Welcome Refugees" at IAD organized by a social group identifying itself as "Standing Up For Racial Justice of Northern Virginia".
- Virginia Governor Terry McAuliffe gave a speech to the media in opposition to President Donald Trump's Executive Order "Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States" temporarily banning immigrants and non-immigrants from seven majority-Muslim countries entry into the United States.
- Social justice group "Standing Up For Racial Justice of Northern Virginia" organized a welcome rally via social media to take place at Washington Dulles Airport. The Governor and state attorney general gave a press conference and left Washington Dulles after briefly speaking with rally attendees.
- Rally organizer, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C), representing the group stated to media sources that the group was planning a show of solidarity to international arrivals, immigrants, refugees coming into this country, who might be afraid of the executive order, to let them know the group supports and welcomes them.
- Estimated by Airport authority that this event has drawn up to 300 participants. Protestors have been witnessed cheering when passengers exit the FIS, and occasionally chanting "*love, not hate. That's what makes America great.*"
- In light of the rally/demonstration ongoing in the main terminal, CBP personnel have been mustered regarding situational awareness and to take appropriate safety precautions to include limiting traversing public areas of the terminal and use of cover shirts/jackets.
- Personnel have also been advised that they are not to speak to the media or other individuals who may inquire regarding the executive order, but rather are to refer them to public affairs link on CBP.gov and/or notify a supervisor.

Philadelphia International Airport (PHL)

- Information obtained from news outlets and Philadelphia Police Airport Group have identified that a protest is scheduled at the Philadelphia International Airport Arrivals Hallway at 1400 hrs.
- Philadelphia Police Airport Group stated that they will try to contain/reroute the protests to the Departure/Ticketing area (away from the FIS location).
- Philly.com (Will Bunch – columnist) is reporting that a protest is imminent (being organized) at Terminal "A".
 - Expected turn-out is projected to be in the hundreds
 - This is the main entrance and exit for the CBP staff to access the FIS for start/end of shifts
 - Officers will be advised to utilize secondary entrances, wear cover shirts or report to work in plain clothes

- Officers are reminded that body armor is recommended and mustered multiple times not to engage the general public, media outlets, etc
- Officers have been mustered multiple times that if engaged, they are to state that they are not authorized to comment
- Additional staffing has been assigned for tomorrow
- Egress and Ingress points will be staffed by officers/supervisors
- Officers have been advise to remain vigilant and to challenge individuals who are accessing our area
- PHI CBP Supervisors have been monitoring (not responding too) social media.

Baltimore International Airport (BWI):

UPDATE:

- On January 28, 2017, Captain (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) of the MDTA Police confirmed that a protest is scheduled for tomorrow, Sunday January 29, 2017 from 1700-2100. The protest will be held in the International Arrivals Hall at BWI.
- CBP Management and MDTA Police Captain (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) coordinated a teleconference to discuss the protest particulars.
- MDTA Police will have additional officers on hand at BWI.
- Social Media Link: [GetGroundGame.com/airport protests](http://GetGroundGame.com/airport%20protests). Reports protest will begin at 1700-2000 and advising protesters to drive or take train directly to Pier E (International Terminal) of BWI.
- The number of protesters is not currently known. It is anticipated the protest will be peaceful.
- It is unknown whether media will be present.
- MDTA Police is arranging a teleconference tomorrow. Call information: Time: 1000am. 1-877-620-6892 code: 8016962830. CBP Baltimore Management will be on the call.
- CBP Baltimore will not be engaging the protesters and employees. There is no known threat to CBP Baltimore.
- CBP employees will be re-mustered on the received EO guidance, officer/employee situational awareness (wearing a cover, escorting agriculture specialists, staying within the FIS, etc), and referring all media inquiries to appropriate contacts.

- The MDTA Police and MAA are not aware of any planned protests for today or tomorrow.

Boston Field Office:Boston-Logan International Airport (BOS)**UPDATE:**

- The protest at Boston Logan Airport has grown to approximately 100 people. The protest is being led by the Local ACLU and Boston City Councilor Tito Jackson.
- At 2015 Senator Elizabeth Warren arrived and is speaking with protesters, it is anticipated that she will make a statement to the media on site.
- The protesters are chanting "say it loud stay it clear everyone is welcome here"
- The protest is being held outside the CBP FIS main arrivals door.
- As of now there is no impact to CBP operations.
- CBP Boston has stationed additional staff on the secure side of the FIS exit door to prevent protesters from entering.
- Multiple media outlets are covering the protest.
- In addition to the protest there are multiple immigration attorneys handing out literature and posting signs.
- The Massachusetts State Police and Massport are on site and are monitoring the situation.

- On January 28, 2017, Massachusetts District Attorney Maura Healey hosted a press conference outside the CBP Federal Inspection (FIS) area main arrivals door at BOS in response the Presidential Executive Order: Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry Into the United States and was covered by two (2) media outlets.
- Additionally approximately five (5) protesters have gathered. CBP along with the Massachusetts State Police and Massport are monitoring the developing situation.

Chicago Field Office:Chicago-O'Hare International Airport (ORD)

- Activists and elected officials called for an "emergency protest" at O'Hare **Airport's** international terminal. (no further details)

Port of Minneapolis/St. Paul (MSP)

- On January 28, 2017, at 1645 hours (CST), Minneapolis Airport Police Department called and relayed that a group of approximately 30-40 individuals have organized a demonstration/protest via Facebook, at the Minneapolis Airport, terminal one.

- The dispatcher stated that 30-40 protestors have organized via Facebook and are currently gathering at the Minneapolis International Airport, Terminal one and planned to walk through the terminal and meet at the CBP/FIS exit doors, and greet people as they arrived. The Minneapolis Airport Police Department is monitoring the group by camera and also have officers present.
- All CBP staffed have been mustered and information disseminated.
- All officers were advised to travel in pairs and to wear a cover shirt when leaving the FIS area. The staff was also advised that any questions from the media should be directed to the Chief in Charge.
- The camera system within CBP does show that there are individuals gathering in the baggage claim area, near the FIS exit holding signs and cameras.
- Two CBPO's are assigned to EGRESS and any activity will be reported as soon as possible.

San Francisco Field Office

San Francisco International Airport (SFO)

UPDATE:

- There are approximately 800 protestors outside the FIS exit arrival area at this time.
- The protestors have been banging on the FIS exit arrival area doors at times.
- The San Francisco Police Department has deployed their riot gear in preparation of the unruly protestors within the San Francisco International Terminal Area.
- The Global Entry office is currently closed due to the unruly protestors within the area of the Global Entry Office. We are currently contacting the people that have appointments so that they can reschedule.
- According to SFPD, California Lieutenant Governor Gavin Newsom is present among the protestors; he has not reached out to CBP at this time.

-
- CBP was informed by the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD) that there are demonstrations anticipated at the San Francisco International Airport this afternoon. The demonstrations are in reaction to the recent presidential executive orders dealing with immigration.
 - The San Francisco Airport reported a demonstration in front of the Departures level by a group called "Not In Our Name." SFPD will monitor situation and not interfere unless the group breaks any laws, such as trying to enter the FIS. SFPD stated they will have officers posted around the FIS exit to monitor situation.
 - The demonstration has had no significant impact on CBP operations.
 - The group outside the "A" exit to the arrivals lobby has been dispersed.
 - Per SFPD approximately 300 protestors are massed on the curb outside the FIS arrivals lobby. SFPD states they are hearing "chatter" from some in the crowd suggesting that "they rush the doors" to the FIS

and “free those being illegally detained by CBP”. SFPD states they are reaching out to San Mateo County Sheriff’s Department for assistance in crowd control.

- CBP SFO is shutting down the “San Francisco Arrivals” set of exit doors, and rerouting passengers to utilize only the “Connecting Flights” set of exit doors as the sole means of exiting the FIS
- Armed CBP officers are stationed at both sets of exit doors to control entry
- CBP SFO is maintaining constant communication with SFPD to in order to monitor protest activity and assess risk.
- DFO Humphrey was on scene at SFO to oversee overall operations and ensure smooth and efficient processing of affected arriving aliens.

Houston Field Office:

Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport (DFW)

- On Saturday, January 28, 2017, at approximately 1630 hours, approx. 50-60 protesters and news media gathered outside the DFW International Airport FIS exit.
- Onsite were what appeared to be representatives from 10 different news media outlets with filming equipment. The DFW Police Department is onsite as well.
- At this time protesters are still onsite; however, passengers exiting the FIS were not being interfered with.



Houston-Bush Intercontinental Airport (IAH)

- On January 28, 2017, at 1940 hours (CST), CBP IAH was advised of possible protests outside of the FIS arrivals area.
- Approximately 60-70 protesters organized in the Terminal E arrival area and began protesting by chanting and clapping while traveler exited the FIS.
- Houston Police Department was on site in case any issues arises.
- Protesters were peaceful in their appearance, no issues reported. Local News media was present.

- CBP personnel were advised to not go into the public area where protest was being held.
- Additional staff was reallocated to Exit control to ensure no un-authorized access was gained by protesters.

San Diego Field Office:

San Diego International Airport (SAN)

- On January 28, 2017, at approximately 1630 hours, Assistant Port Director (APD) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) informed Supervisor (SCBPO) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) that he received information from HPD that a protest was taking place at San Diego International Airport.
- The protesters are at the curbside arrivals- lower level- at Terminal 2 (west) near Delta Airlines. Protesters location is currently away from San Diego CBP FIS.
- 1700 hrs: Protesters number at about 20 people.
- 1745 hrs: Protesters numbers have risen to about 100 people.
- No media attention at this time.
- CBP San Diego requested Harbor Police and the Airport Authority to inform CBP if changes within the protest escalate.
- For officer safety, all CBP staff have been briefed and instructed to take precautionary measures (ie: cover shirts) when leaving the premises of the FIS, and depart in pairs.
- Additional precautionary measure were the relocation of CBP marked units parked curbside Terminal 2, to the interior parking lots away from public view.
- Protest has no impact/disruption on Port Operations. There are no arriving passengers in the FIS subject to the EO.
- FIS Supervisors have been monitoring the gathering of protesters, and will update as necessary.



Detroit Field Office:Detroit Metropolitan Airport (DTW)

- On January 28, 2017, CBP DTW was informed by the WCAA Police of social media reports regarding a planned protest at the Detroit Metropolitan Airport, McNamara Terminal scheduled to take place on January 29, 2017 from 1600 – 1800 hours
- Reports claim that 1000 people have signed up for the protest and several hundred more people may participate
- WCAA Police is coordinating with the airport Public Relations and Maintenance Department to establish an authorized picketing area
- In order to accommodate the number of protesters, the WCAA will allow three authorized picketing areas at the McNamara Terminal:
 - o Curbside at the departures level
 - o Curbside at the arrivals level
 - o Curbside at the international arrivals level
- WCAA is considering as overflow area inside the airport in the domestic baggage area, if necessary
- CBP/DTW Port Director will meet with WCAA prior to the event to view areas designated for the protesters
- CBP will establish a plain-clothes CBP officer as an observer in the International Arrivals Lobby outside of the FIS. The CBP officer will be equipped with a radio to maintain communications with the CBP Watch Commander/ Command Center
- CBP will increase security near the exit of the FIS to maintain safety of staff and passengers

Los Angeles Field Office:Los Angeles International Airport (LAX)

- On January 28, 2017, attorneys, private citizens and members of the media began to arrive at the Public Information Office (PIO) at the Tom Bradley International Terminal (TBIT). The CBP Officer assigned to PIO advised the inquiring parties to contact the Office Public Affairs. Due to the size of the crowd, a Supervisory CBPO and additional CBPOs were deployed to PIO to assist. The SCBPO and additional CBPOs handed OPA contact information to the inquiring parties. The PIO, which normally is staffed from 0700-2300 hours, was closed at 1700 due to security concerns related to the protest.
- Between 1600 and 1700 hours, approximately 150 protestors arrived and began holding an organized vigil outside the TBIT departure level. There are six media vans and reporters are interviewing both passengers and protestors. There is no CBP presence in the area.

- The Los Angeles World Airport (LAWA) Police Department has deployed an enhanced visible presence in the area.
- CBP has deployed a limited Tactical Enforcement Operation (TEO) contingent in the internal FIS egress area, out of the public view. A similar contingent will be deployed tomorrow.
- Attorneys advertising their services and holding signs are lingering in the PIO area.

Executive Summary:

On January 28, 2017 two male passengers arriving aboard EK 227 were found inadmissible under the January 27th Presidential Executive Order. The passengers were allowed to withdraw their application for admission. Arrangement were made with Emirates Airlines to remove the passengers from the U.S. aboard EK 230, departing at 1700 hours the same day.

At approximately 1610 hours, CBP escorted the two passengers to their departure flight and they boarded the aircraft. While at the boarding gate, CBP was informed that the Port of Seattle was delaying the departure of the flight pending a decision by a Federal Judge on a petition filed by immigration attorneys on behalf of the two passengers preventing them from departing the U.S. At approximately 1745, Federal Judge Thomas Zilly approved the petition and both passengers were removed from the plane and returned to CBP Secondary. Both passengers were transported to the NWDC to await the outcome of the court hearing.

Details of the Incident / Date and Time:

- On January 28, 2017, at 0612 hours, passengers (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) arrived aboard EK 227.
- They were referred to Passport Hard Secondary because they matched the criteria outlined in the January 27th Presidential Executive Order.
- Both were found inadmissible based on the order and were allowed to withdraw their applications for admission.
- The passengers were identified as:

- Arrangements were made with Emirates Airlines to remove the passengers on EK 230, departing a 1700 hours the same day.
- At 1610 hours the passengers were escorted to the departure gate and boarding the aircraft.

- At approximately 1700 hours, CBP was informed by the Port of Seattle that the flight departure would be delayed pending the decision of a Federal Judge concerning the departure of the two passengers.
 - At 1715 hours, ADFO (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and AAPD Bol briefed on the situation.
 - At 1745 hours, CBP was informed that the judge had granted the petition and that the two passengers were not to depart the U.S.
 - At 1805 hours, both passengers were removed from the aircraft and escorted back to CBP Secondary.
 - At approximately 1815 hours, Area Port Director (APD) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and Assistant Area Port Director (AAPD) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) met with a congressional congregation consisting of Congresswomen Susan Del Bene and Pramilla Jayapal and various staffers and Governor Jay Insee and Senator Patty Murray on the phone.
 - APD Wilkerson informed the group that Director, Field Operations Michele James is actively trying to setup a CBP Congressional call for the group.
 - The group asked several specific questions regarding the travelers and if CBP has identified any additional travelers on future flights that will be the subject of the executive order. APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) told the group that information will be conveyed to them on the congressional call.
 - The following questions were asked and APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) informed the group that the questions will be forwarded for an appropriate response.
1. Will local CBP honor the Federal Order granting the emergency motion for stay of removal of aliens?
 2. Will the traveler that was returned earlier today be allowed to return immediately because of the Federal Order and stay in the U.S. until there is a ruling?
 3. Where will the two that were just removed from the Emirates flight be housed until a ruling on the legal sufficiency of the Executive Order can be determined? Will they stay at Sea-Tac and if so, do you have the appropriate facilities here?
 4. Northwest Immigrant Rights Project is the legal representative for the two travelers, and they gave CBP legal representation information and asked CBP to provide it to the travelers. In addition, they wanted to know when they can meet with their clients.
 5. Will anyone else that arrives be allowed to stay in the Washington State until a ruling is made on the Executive Order?
 6. Demanding the number of travelers expected to arrive in Washington State and their status be provided to Governor Inslee and Senator Murray's Offices.
 7. They indicated that no one [indicated the CBP Congressional Affairs had no information] has been providing any information to the Washington State elected representatives, and when will information be provided?
- Currently, it has been reported that approximately 2500 protestors are in the Sea-Tac Airport main terminal, and anarchist have joined the protest. (b)(7)(E) groups have been activated and deployed to the airport.
 - CBP Seattle mustered all employees for safety and situational awareness. CBP Seattle has arranged a shuttle with the Port of Seattle to transportation employees via the tarmac to the employee parking garage.
 - For the next 24 hours 15 travelers have been identified that may be affected by the executive order breakdown below:

I received the below email from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) of Governor Jay Inslee staff. He outlined some specific actions that they expect CBP Seattle to execute. I responded to his email by informing him that Seattle CBP is willing to assist as much as possible to process the (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) without any unnecessary delays upon his arrival, however, our local ability to contact the State Department and airline overseas (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) is out of our immediate abilities. We will be elevating this situation up through our chain of command to Washington, DC, and possibly a CBP office at the Headquarters level could facilitate what you have outlined with the State Department- the reissuance of the visa and/or provide a travel letter for Mr. Rabi since he does not have a passport and visa.

We sent bullets to your attention, and is it possible for you to ask or point out that HQ may need to assist in coordinating some of these action with the Department of State.

It appears that CBP is prepared to allow (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to enter the United States upon his entry at Sea-Tac airport, under the terms of his previously-issued visa. Furthermore, the CPB team is helpfully prepared to work with the airline carrier to ensure they are aware of (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) ability to enter the U.S., so that he is allowed to board his flight.

However, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) physical immigrant visa packet and visa were held in Seattle when he was sent back to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) on Saturday. My understanding is that he is not in possession of a passport, but was relying on these documents for entry and for travel. Furthermore, our understand is that his visa remains listed as "cancelled" in the State Department system. And, because of these things, and given the fact that he has to travel from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) before continuing on a flight to Seattle, there is a concern that he will not be allowed to board his flight(s), due to the airline or potentially in an issue with European customs in intra-Euro travel.

Can the CPB team assist (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and her client in getting in touch with the State Department to 1) revise his "cancelled" visa status, and 2) obtain a written document that will clearly indicate that his ability to travel from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to Seattle? Again, we appreciate your willingness to communicate directly with the carrier, as well. That will also be important, but (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and her client are worried it will be insufficient.

Executive Summary:

On January 28, 2017 a male citizen of Somalia, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) arrived aboard (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). The passenger applied for admission as a first time immigrant. He was referred to hard secondary because he met the criteria for January 27th Presidential Executive Order. He was found inadmissible based on the Executive Order and was allowed to withdraw his application for admission. His immigrant visa package was retained by CBP and his Immigrant Visa was cancelled. He was returned to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) later that day on (b)(6), (b)(7)(C).

On February 3, 2017, in response to a District Court ruling enjoining the Executive Order, the Deputy Assistant Secretary (Edward Ramotowski) for the Department of State reversed the provisional revocation of all visa provisionally revoked on January 27, 2017.

On February 4, 2017, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) immigration attorney, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) contacted APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) seeking assistance in getting (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) back to the U.S. She indicated that (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was currently in (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and wished to return to the U.S. as an immigrant, however he is not in possession of a passport or an immigrant visa that would allow him to board a flight to the U.S. In an attempt to facilitate his return, CBP Seattle attempted to contact IAP (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to request assistance with boarding (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) on a Seattle bound flight. However, due to time difference, no officers were on duty. It was later determined that (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was actually in (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and that he would be boarding a flight there. CBP Seattle informed (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) that Seattle would process (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) if he could get to Seattle, however he would need to contact the Department of State (DOS) to obtain a boarding letter and visa. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) indicated that she understood that it wasn't a CBP issue and that she would be reaching out to Governor Inslee's office to get assistance in resolving the matter with the DOS so (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) could board the plane.

Details of the Incident / Date and Time:

· On January 27, 2014, Presidential Executive Order "Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States" enacted.

· On January 28, 2017 at 1035 hours, Somalia citizen, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) arrives aboard (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and applies for admission as a new immigrant.

· (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) is denied admission and allowed to withdraw his application for admission.

· At 1345 hours, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) is returned to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) aboard (b)(6), (b)(7)(C).

· On February 3, 2017 at approximately 1700 hours, a District Court rules issues a temporary restraining order suspending the Presidential Executive Order.

* On February 4, 2017, at 1150 hours, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) contacted APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) by email, seeking assistance with getting (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) back to the U.S.

* At 1210 hours, APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) contacted (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to help coordinate (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) return.

* At 1227 hours, multiple attempts to contact IAP (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) were made, but were unsuccessful.

* Mrs. Edward was informed that CBP Seattle would process (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) if he arrive in Seattle but she would need to contact the DOS about obtaining a boarding letter and/or a visa that would allow him to board a plane to the U.S.

* (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) indicated that she understood that CBP could not help her with this and that she would seek assistance from Governor Inslee's office to help resolve the matter with DOS.



It appears that CBP is prepared to allow (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to enter the United States upon his entry at Sea-Tac airport, under the terms of his previously-issued visa. Furthermore, the CPB team is helpfully prepared to work with the airline carrier to ensure they are aware of (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) ability to enter the U.S., so that he is allowed to board his flight.

Please see new guidance on the processing of Canadian Landed Immigrants and Executive Order “Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States”

Effective immediately, Canadian Landed Immigrants that are citizens of Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen with a valid U.S. Visa may be considered for an exemption of the 212(f) bar under Section 3(g) of the President’s Executive Order if and only if the person satisfies the following conditions:

1. Proof to the satisfaction of the inspection Officer of person’s Landed Immigrant Status in Canada;

- 2. Possession of a valid U.S. visa;
- 3. Travel that originates in Canada;
- 4. From only a pre-clearance airport; or
- 5. Applying for admission at a land border port of entry;
- 6. And the applicant is otherwise admissible.

The admission of such individuals must be in the national interest of the United States. Prior to any such admission, each individual must be subjected to a thorough examination by an immigration officer, to include CBP conduct of: (b)(7)(E)

The port will conduct a (b)(7)(E) (b)(7)(E) consideration for a waiver pursuant to Section 3(g) or 5(a) as appropriate. In considering a waiver you will need to consider if it is in the best interest of the U.S., not granting the waiver would cause an undue hardship or have significant compelling reasons. Examples could include returning students, seeking medical treatment in the U.S., not someone who wants to go to K-Mart for the sales.

If you are considering a waiver please contact the DFO or myself for guidance, I attached an example of the format that will be used to request the waiver. Once the DFO has concurred with the request she will coordinate with HQ to seek approval from C-1 which could take hours to 30 minutes considering the time of day it was requested.

**SUMMARY AND ANALYSIS OF EXECUTIVE ORDER
“Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States”**

January 27, 2017

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On Friday, January 27, 2017, President Trump signed an executive order, “Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States” The provisions contained in the order are unlikely to make our nation safer. Instead, they will leave thousands of refugees who face life-threatening danger without protection by halting all U.S. refugee admissions for four months and Syrian refugee admissions indefinitely. The order also imposes a 90-day ban on entry for all nationals of seven predominantly Muslim nations without requiring any individualized determination based on specific intelligence that the person is a security risk. Broad language in the order appears to be designed to target people of Muslim faith. The order also imposes additional security protocols, including a requirement that U.S. government officials interview every person who applies for a nonimmigrant visa.

Suspension of U.S. Refugee Admissions Program (USRAP): The order suspends the USRAP for 120 days. Exceptions can be made on a case-by-case basis if it is in the national interest, the person would not pose a risk, and the person is a religious minority facing religious persecution, or the admission of the person is required to conform U.S. conduct to an international agreement, or when a person is already in transit and denying admission would cause hardship. In addition, for the current fiscal year, the order reduces the number of refugees to be admitted to the U.S. by more than half from an initial goal set by President Obama of 110,000 to 50,000, dropping U.S. refugee admissions to the lowest level in a decade. Having already admitted 29,895 refugees as of January 20, 2017, the United States would only admit 20,000 more refugees for the remainder of the year. The order also directs DHS to determine the extent to which state and local jurisdictions may have greater involvement in determining the placement or resettlement of refugees in their jurisdictions.

Ban on Syrian Refugees: The order halts the processing and admission of Syrian refugees indefinitely, until the President determines that sufficient changes have been made to ensure that the admission of Syrian refugees is in the national interest. Last year the U.S. accepted about 10,000 Syrians fleeing the civil war—far fewer than other Western countries.

Ban on Entry of Nationals of Muslim-Majority Countries: The order bans immigrant and nonimmigrant entries, for at least 90 days, for nationals of Iraq, Iran, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, and

Yemen [by reference to INA §217(a)(12)]. Other countries may be added and adjudications of other immigration benefits could be impacted. As described in Section 1, the order also calls for the exclusion of people who “would place violent ideologies over American law” or “who engage in acts of bigotry or hatred (including ‘honor’ killings, other forms of violence against women, or the persecution of those who practice religions different from their own)....” This language is vague and appears highly susceptible to discriminatory abuse against people of Muslim faith.

Requires In-Person Interviews for Most Nonimmigrant Visa Applicants. The order suspends the Visa Interview Waiver Program (VIWP), requiring all nonimmigrant visa applicants to attend an interview unless an interview is not required by statute. The VIWP allowed consular officers to waive the interview requirement for applicants seeking to renew nonimmigrant visas within 12 months of expiration of the initial visa in the same classification. Suspending the VIWP will place enormous burdens on U.S. consulates and embassies (particularly high-volume posts) by increasing already extended interview wait times and processing times, wasting limited resources, and decreasing the quality of consular interviews. The VIWP has been used to waive the interview requirement only for travelers who have already been vetted and determined to be a low security risk and who have a demonstrated track record of stable employment and stable travel. Limited consular resources should be primarily devoted to high risk or new visa applicant cases where eligibility or security is a concern.

Screening of all Immigration Benefits: The order directs federal agencies to develop screening standards and procedures for all immigration benefits to identify fraud and detect whether a person intends to do harm. Agencies are directed to create a process to evaluate the person’s “likelihood of becoming a positively contributing member of society” and “ability to make contributions to the national interest.” These standards are not required by law (except in very limited circumstances), are extremely subjective, and will create significant and often insurmountable barriers for many individuals.

Biometric-Entry Exit: The order directs agencies to expedite the completion and implementation of a biometric entry-exit system and includes reporting requirements. Since 1996, Congress has mandated that an automated entry-exit system be developed and implemented at all air, land, and sea ports of entry in an attempt to track those who overstay their visas. While DHS implemented biometric entry in 2006, a biometric exit system has been held up by numerous obstacles and logistical issues. The completion of an integrated biometrics entry-exit system would require significant funding. The FY 2016 Consolidated Appropriations Act authorizes up to \$1 billion for a biometric exit program, to be collected through fee surcharges over a period of up to 10 years. DHS has noted that a comprehensive entry-exit system at all ports of entry will require additional resources.

SECTION-BY-SECTION AND ANALYSIS

Sec. 1 and 2: Purpose and Policy

- Discusses the purpose of the visa issuance process and how it has to keep America safe.
- The U.S. “cannot, and should not, admit those who do not support the Constitution, or those who would place violent ideologies over American law. In addition, the United States should not admit those who engage in acts of bigotry or hatred (including “honor” killings, other forms of violence against women, or the persecution of those who practice religions different from their own) or those who would oppress Americans of any race, gender, or sexual orientation.”

Sec. 3: Suspension of Issuance of Visas and Other Immigration Benefits to Nationals of Countries of Particular Concern

- Pursuant to INA §212(f), suspends “entry” (immigrants and nonimmigrants) of “aliens from countries” designated pursuant to INA §217(a)(12) for 90 days from the date of the EO.
- Countries identified in INA §217(a)(12) and later added to the list of countries with Visa Waiver restrictions are: Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, and Yemen.
- Excludes diplomats, NATO visas, C-2s (United Nations-related visas), and G visas (international organization officials and employees and their immediate family members).
- DHS, DOS and Director of National Intelligence (DNI) will conduct an immediate review to determine the information needed from any country for adjudication of any visa, admission, or other benefit under the INA to make sure that the person is who they claim to be and is not a security or public safety threat.
- Within 30 days, DHS must submit a report to the President of its conclusions and include a list of the countries that do not provide adequate information for adjudications. Identified countries will be given 60 days to start providing required information.
- After 60 days, DHS will submit a list of countries recommended to be included in a Presidential Proclamation prohibiting the “entry of foreign nationals” (excluding diplomats, NATO, C-2s, and G visas) from countries that have not complied until compliance occurs.
- Additional countries may be added at any time.
- Narrow exception permitting issuance of visas or other immigration benefits “to nationals of [such] countries” on a case-by-case basis when it is in the national interest during the suspension period.
- Imposes reporting requirements 30, 60, 90, and 120 days from the date of the EO.

Questions and Analysis:

- INA §212(f) pertains to “entry” but title and paragraphs (a) and (g) reference “other immigration benefits under the INA.” To what extent does this apply to immigration benefits (adjustment of status, nonimmigrant extensions, etc.) adjudicated by USCIS?
- Does the suspension on “entries” also mean that DOS must cease issuing visas? Paragraph (g) states that visas and other immigration benefits may be issued if “in the national interest” during the suspension period but paragraph (c) states that only “entries” are suspended. Title also refers to “suspension of issuance of visas.”
- Section 3 references “aliens from countries” designated pursuant to INA §217(a)(12), “foreign nationals” from such countries, and “nationals” of such countries. Who does this encompass? Citizens? Nationals? Dual citizens or nationals? What if a person is a dual citizen of a designated country but hasn’t been there in 20 years?

Sec. 4: Implementing Uniform Screening Standards for All Immigration Programs

- Directs DOS, DHS, DNI, and the FBI to implement a program to identify individuals “seeking to enter the United States on a fraudulent basis with the intent to cause harm, or who are at risk of causing harm subsequent to their admission.”
- Program must include:
 - Uniform screening standards and procedures (such as in-person interviews);
 - The creation of a database of identity documents;
 - Amended application forms with questions “aimed at identifying fraudulent answers and malicious intent”;

- A mechanism to ensure that individuals are who they claim to be;
 - A process to evaluate the person's "likelihood of becoming a positively contributing member of society" and "ability to make contributions to the national interest"; and
 - A mechanism to assess whether the applicant has the intent to commit criminal or terrorist acts after entering the United States.
- Imposes reporting requirements 60, 100, 200 days of the date of the EO.

Questions and Analysis:

- This type of additional screening will result in significant backlogs at USCIS offices at the local and service center level, consular processing backlogs, and crowding of secondary inspection sites at CBP ports of entry, resulting in a stifling of business and economic contributions of those seeking to come to the U.S.
- The U.S. already has a robust system in place for vetting all visa applicants, particularly after the expansion of security screening after 9/11.
- In addition, several of these components already exist. For example, all individuals are required to have biometrics captured, and to have fingerprints taken to confirm identity at interviews with DHS and DOS.
- How does the government purport to measure "likelihood of becoming a positively contributing member of society" and "ability to make contributions to the national interest."? Such a determination is inherently subjective and will create significant and often insurmountable barriers for many individuals.
- Legally, unless the person is applying for an employment-based national interest waiver, then there is no statutory requirement for an applicant to show that his/her presence will benefit the U.S. national interest.
- This kind of screening will be time intensive, will require additional government resources, and will duplicate investigations that are already being undertaken with respect to security issues.
- Will this type of screening be done by CBP upon seeking admission? If so, this will create significant delays at CBP ports of entry. Also, CBP officers aren't trained or necessarily qualified to make determinations on whether a person will contribute to society or the national interest.

Sec. 5: Realignment of U.S. Refugee Admissions Program for Fiscal Year 2017

- Suspends U.S. Refugee Admissions Program (USRAP) for 120 days.
- Halts processing and admission of Syrian refugees indefinitely, until the President determines sufficient changes have been made to ensure USRAP aligns with national interest.
- Limited exceptions allowing for the admission of individual refugees on a case-by-case basis if it is in the national interest, including when the person is a religious minority in his/her country of nationality facing religious persecution, when admitting the person would enable the U.S. to conform its conduct with a preexisting international agreement, or when the person is already in transit and denying admission would cause undue hardship. Admission cannot pose a risk to the United States.
- During 120 day period, DOS/DHS shall review the USRAP application and adjudication process and determine/implement additional procedures to ensure those who are approved do not pose a threat.
- Applicants already in the USRAP process may be admitted once revised security procedures are implemented.

- After 120 days, USRAP admissions will resume only for nationals of countries where DOS, DHS, and DNI have jointly determined that additional procedures are adequate to ensure U.S. security.
- Once USRAP is resumed, refugee claims based on religious persecution are to be prioritized, but only if person is a minority religion in their country of nationality. DOS and DHS shall recommend legislative changes to assist with such prioritization if necessary.
- Refugee ceiling is lowered from 110,000 to 50,000 for remainder of FY 2017.
- Imposes reporting requirements on the prioritization of claims 100 and 200 days from the date of the EO.
- Directs DHS to examine laws to determine the extent to which state and local jurisdictions may have greater involvement in determining placement or resettlement of refugees in their jurisdictions.

Questions and Analysis:

- 50,000 would be the lowest ceiling on refugee admissions in a decade, and comes at a time when the world is experiencing a massive forced migration crisis.
- Completely halting the refugee process for 4 months is unprecedented. After 9/11, USRAP was suspended for less than 3 months.
- The 120 day suspension will mean that U.S. families that have already been separated for many months, if not years, will be further delayed from reuniting.
- Refugees are already required to go through an extensive vetting and security clearance process that includes background checks, biometrics, medical screening and in-person interviews.

Sec. 6: Rescission of Exercise of Authority Relating to the Terrorism Grounds of Inadmissibility

- Directs agencies to consult and *consider rescinding* TRIG [INA §212(a)(3)] exemptions and waivers and implementing memoranda.

Sec. 7: Expedited Completion of the Biometric Entry-Exit Tracking System

- Directs agencies to expedite completion and implementation of a biometric entry-exit tracking system for all travelers to the United States.
- Imposes reporting requirements in 100, 200, 365 days of the date of the EO, and every 180 days thereafter until system is fully operational.

Questions and Analysis:

- Biometrics have been collected from most individuals upon entry since 2009 (US-VISIT, ESTA) but it has been much more challenging to implement a system for collecting data from those departing from the U.S.
- DHS has identified three primary obstacles that have delayed implementation of the collection of exit data: (1) collection of such data would disrupt the flow of travelers through air terminals; (2) air carriers and airport authorities have so far blocked testing of a method that incorporates the collection of biometric data into passenger processing at the departure gate; and (3) questions about which personnel would be responsible for collecting departure data.
- Even with a system in place, the benefits of knowing who has left the country are not as significant as knowing who is entering the country.

- While biometric data collection upon exit might give better information about who has overstayed a period of authorized admission, it would *not* tell law enforcement where the individual is *located* within the country.

Sec. 8: Visa Interview Security

- Directs DOS to immediately suspend the Visa Interview Waiver Program and ensure compliance with INA §222 interview requirements.
- Expands Consular Fellows Program “to ensure that nonimmigrant visa interview wait times are not unduly affected.”

Questions and Analysis:

- INA §222(h) requires a personal interview of a visa applicant, but grants consuls abroad discretion to waive the requirement.
- Suspending the VIWP will place enormous burdens on U.S. consulates and embassies (particularly high-volume posts) by increasing already extended interview wait times and processing times, wasting limited resources, and decreasing the quality of consular interviews.
- Visa interview waivers are only granted to low risk travelers who have already been vetted by the U.S. government, such as the very elderly, very young, or individuals who have demonstrated a track record of stable employment, stable travel, and/or a previous determination of low security risk. Consular resources should be devoted to high risk or new visa applicant cases where eligibility or security is a concern.
- The VIWP is largely utilized for employment-based nonimmigrant applicants, such as H, O, P, and L, who are simply seeking a renewal visa. Requiring everyone to go through an interview will impede the ability of employment based visa applicants to obtain a visa and return to the U.S. quickly, which will disrupt U.S. businesses and the flow of commerce.
- Requiring every person to be interviewed, even those that have already been vetted, will increase security risks for already crowded consulates and embassies, as more people will be required to enter the premises.
- Consular Fellows must be hired, trained (including language training in some cases), and obtain security/country-specific clearances. In addition to the fact that these Fellows will be inexperienced, it will take a significant amount of time and resources to place them at consular posts, and this will not lend quick relief to increased processing times and resource challenges.
- Imposing additional visa application burdens on foreign nationals invites reciprocal requirements being imposed by foreign governments, thereby restricting the ability of American citizens to travel abroad for business or tourism.

Sec. 9: Visa Validity Reciprocity

- Directs DOS to review all nonimmigrant reciprocity agreements to ensure they are “truly reciprocal” in terms of visa validity periods, fees, and other treatment.
- Directs DOS to adjust reciprocity agreements to the extent practicable for countries that do not treat U.S. nationals equally.

Sec. 10: Transparency and Data Collection

- Directs DHS, in consultation with the AG, to collect and publish, in 180 days and every 180 days thereafter, information regarding:

- The number of foreign nationals in the U.S. who have been charged or convicted with terrorism-related offenses while in the U.S.; removed from the United States based on terrorism-related activity or national security reasons;
 - The number of foreign nationals in the U.S. who have been radicalized after entry into the U.S. and engaged in terrorist acts or provided support to a terrorist organization; and
 - Information regarding the number and types of acts of gender-based violence against women or honor killings by foreign nationals people in the U.S.
- Directs DOS to report costs associated with USRAP at the federal, state, and local level within one year.

Sec. 11: General Provisions.

- EO will be implemented consistent with applicable law and subject to appropriations.
- EO does not create any enforceable rights or benefits.

Please see new guidance on the processing of Canadian Landed Immigrants and Executive Order "Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States"

Effective immediately, Canadian Landed Immigrants that are citizens of Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen with a valid U.S. Visa may be considered for an exemption of the 212(f) bar under Section 3(g) of the President's Executive Order if and only if the person satisfies the following conditions:

1. Proof to the satisfaction of the inspection Officer of person's Landed Immigrant Status in Canada;
2. Possession of a valid U.S. visa;
3. Travel that originates in Canada;
4. From only a pre-clearance airport; or
5. Applying for admission at a land border port of entry;
6. And the applicant is otherwise admissible.

The admission of such individuals must be in the national interest of the United States. Prior to any such admission, each individual must be subjected to a thorough examination by an immigration officer, to include CBP conduct of:

It appears that CBP is prepared to allow (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to enter the United States upon his entry at Sea-Tac airport, under the terms of his previously-issued visa. Furthermore, the CPB team is helpfully prepared to work with the airline carrier to ensure they are aware of (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) ability to enter the U.S., so that he is allowed to board his flight.

However (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) physical immigrant visa packet and visa were held in Seattle when he was sent back to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) on Saturday. My understanding is that he is not in possession of a passport, but was relying on these documents for entry and for travel. Furthermore, our understand is that his visa remains listed as “cancelled” in the State Department system. And, because of these things, and given the fact that he has to travel from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) before continuing on a flight to Seattle, there is a concern that he will not be allowed to board his flight(s), due to the airline or potentially in an issue with European customs in intra-Euro travel.

Can the CPB team assist (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and her client in getting in touch with the State Department to 1) revise his “cancelled” visa status, and 2) obtain a written document that will clearly indicate that his ability to travel from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to Seattle? Again, we appreciate your willingness to communicate directly with the carrier, as well. That will also be important, but (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and her client are worried it will be insufficient.

Executive Summary:

On January 28, 2017 a male citizen of Somalia, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) arrived aboard (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). The passenger applied for admission as a first time immigrant. He was referred to hard secondary because he met the criteria for January 27th Presidential Executive Order. He was found inadmissible based on the Executive Order and was allowed to withdraw his application for admission. His immigrant visa package was retained by CBP and his Immigrant Visa was cancelled. He was returned to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) later that day on (b)(6), (b)(7)(C).

On February 3, 2017, in response to a District Court ruling enjoining the Executive Order, the Deputy Assistant Secretary (Edward Ramotowski) for the Department of State reversed the provisional revocation of all visa provisionally revoked on January 27, 2017.

On February 4, 2017, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) immigration attorney, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) contacted APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) seeking assistance in getting (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) back to the U.S. She indicated that (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was currently in (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and wished to return to the U.S. as an immigrant, however he is not in possession of a passport or an immigrant visa that would allow him to board a flight to the U.S. In an attempt to facilitate his return, CBP Seattle attempted to contact IAP (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to request assistance with boarding (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) on a Seattle bound flight. However, due to time difference, no officers were on duty. It was later determined that (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was actually in (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and that he would be boarding a flight there. CBP Seattle informed (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) that Seattle would process (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) if he could get to Seattle, however he would need to contact the Department of State (DOS) to obtain a boarding letter and visa. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) indicated that she understood that it wasn't a CBP issue and that she would be reaching out to Governor Inslee's office to get assistance in resolving the matter with the DOS so (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) could board the plane.

Details of the Incident / Date and Time:

On January 27, 2014, Presidential Executive Order "Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States" enacted.

On January 28, 2017 at 1035 hours, Somalia citizen, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) arrives aboard (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and applies for admission as a new immigrant.

(b)(6), (b)(7)(C) is denied admission and allowed to withdraw his application for admission.

At 1345 hours, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) is returned to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)

On February 3, 2017 at approximately 1700 hours, a District Court rules issues a temporary restraining order suspending the Presidential Executive Order.

* On February 4, 2017, at 1150 hours, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) contacted APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) by email, seeking assistance with getting (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) back to the U.S.

* At 1210 hours, APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) contacted (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to help coordinate (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) return.

* At 1227 hours, multiple attempts to contact IAP (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) were made, but were unsuccessful.

* (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was informed that CBP Seattle would process (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) if he arrive in Seattle but she would need to contact the DOS about obtaining a boarding letter and/or a visa that would allow him to board a plane to the U.S.

* (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) indicated that she understood that CBP could not help her with this and that she would seek assistance from Governor Inslee's office to help resolve the matter with DOS.

Until further guidance is provided if you encounter a non-immigrant alien subject to the EO, you may consider requesting a waiver from C-1 through the DFO. The port will conduct a (b)(7)(E)

(b)(7)(E) consideration for a waiver pursuant to Section 3(g) or 5(a) as appropriate. In considering a waiver you will need to consider if it is in the best interest of the U.S., not granting the waiver would cause an undue hardship or have significant compelling reasons. Examples could include returning students, seeking medical treatment in the U.S., not someone who wants to go to K-Mart for the sales.

If you are considering a waiver please contact the DFO or myself for guidance, I attached an example of the format that will be used to request the waiver. Once the DFO has concurred with the request she will coordinate with HQ to seek approval from C-1 which could take hours to minutes considering the time of day it was requested.

Section 3(c) of the Executive Order entitled "Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States" (Jan. 27, 2017) suspends for 90 days the entry into the United States of certain aliens from countries referred to in section 217(a)(12) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), 8 U.S.C. 1187(a)(12). Section 3(e) of the order directs the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of State, to submit to the President a list of countries recommended for inclusion on a Presidential proclamation that would prohibit the entry of certain foreign nationals from countries that do not provide information needed to adjudicate visas, admissions, or other benefits under the INA.

I understand that there has been reasonable uncertainty about whether those provisions apply to lawful permanent residents of the United States. Accordingly, to remove any confusion, I now clarify that Sections 3(c) and 3(e) do not apply to such individuals. Please immediately convey this interpretive guidance to all individuals responsible for the administration and implementation of the Executive Order.

Executive Order—Protecting the Nation from Terrorist Entry into the United States by Foreign Nationals

EXECUTIVE ORDER

PROTECTING THE NATION FROM TERRORIST ENTRY INTO THE UNITED STATES
BY FOREIGN NATIONALS

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and laws of the United States of America, including the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), 8 U.S.C. 1101 et seq., and section 301 of title 3, United States Code, and to protect the American people from terrorist attacks by foreign nationals admitted to the United States, it is hereby ordered as follows:

Section 1. *Purpose.* The visa-issuance process plays a crucial role in detecting individuals with terrorist ties and stopping them from entering the United States. Perhaps in no instance was that more apparent than the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, when State Department policy prevented consular officers from properly scrutinizing the visa applications of several of the 19 foreign nationals who went on to murder nearly 3,000 Americans. And while the visa-issuance process was reviewed and amended after the [September 11](#) attacks to better detect would-be terrorists from receiving visas, these measures did not stop attacks by foreign nationals who were admitted to the United States.

Numerous foreign-born individuals have been convicted or implicated in terrorism-related crimes since September 11, 2001, including foreign nationals who entered the United States after receiving visitor, student, or employment visas, or who entered through the U.S. refugee resettlement program. Deteriorating conditions in certain countries due to war, strife, disaster, and civil unrest increase the likelihood that terrorists will use any means possible to enter the United States. The United States must be vigilant during the visa-issuance process to ensure that those approved for admission do not intend to harm Americans and that they have no ties to terrorism.

In order to protect Americans, the United States must ensure that those admitted to this country do not bear hostile attitudes toward it and its founding principles. We cannot, and should not, admit into our country those who do not support the U.S. Constitution, or those who would place violent ideologies over American law. In addition, the United States should not admit those who engage in acts of bigotry or hatred (including “honor” killings, other forms of violence against women, or the persecution of those who practice religions different from their own) or those who would oppress Americans of any race, gender, or sexual orientation.

Sec. 2. *Policy.* It is the policy of the United States to protect its citizens from foreign nationals who intend to commit terrorist attacks in the United States; and to prevent the admission of foreign nationals who intend to exploit United States immigration laws for malevolent purposes.

Sec. 3. *Suspension of Issuance of Visas and Other Immigration Benefits to Nationals of Countries of Particular Concern.* (a) The Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of State and the Director of National Intelligence, shall immediately conduct a review to determine the information needed from any country for adjudication of any visa, admission, or other benefit under the INA (adjudications) to determine that the individual seeking the benefit is who the individual claims to be and is not a security or public-safety threat.

(b) The Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of State and the Director of National Intelligence, shall submit to the President a report on the results of the

review described in subsection (a) of this section, including the Secretary of Homeland Security's determination of the information needed for adjudications and a list of countries that do not provide adequate information, within 30 days of the date of this order. The Secretary of Homeland Security shall provide a copy of the report to the Secretary of State and Director of National Intelligence.

(c) To temporarily reduce investigative burdens on relevant agencies during the review period described in subsection (a) of this section, to ensure the proper review and maximum utilization of available resources for the screening of foreign nationals, and to ensure that adequate standards are established to prevent the terrorist or criminal infiltration of foreign nationals, pursuant to section 212(f) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182(f), I hereby proclaim that the immigrant and nonimmigrant entry into the United States of aliens from countries referred to in section 217(a)(12) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1187(a)(12), would be detrimental to the interests of the United States, and I hereby suspend entry into the United States, as immigrants and nonimmigrants, of such persons for 90 days from the date of this order (excluding those foreign nationals traveling on diplomatic visas, North Atlantic Treaty Organization visas, and C-2 visas for travel to the United Nations).

(d) Immediately upon receipt of the report described in subsection (b) of this section regarding the information needed for adjudications, the Secretary of State shall request all foreign governments that do not supply such information to start providing such information regarding their nationals within 60 days of notification.

(e) After the 60-day period described in subsection (d) of this section expires, the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of State, shall submit to the President a list of countries recommended for inclusion on a Presidential proclamation that would prohibit the entry of foreign nationals (excluding those foreign nationals traveling on diplomatic visas, North Atlantic Treaty Organization visas, and C-2 visas for travel to the United Nations) from countries that do not provide the information requested pursuant to subsection (d) of this section until compliance occurs.

(f) At any point after submitting the list described in subsection (e) of this section, the Secretary of State or the Secretary of Homeland Security may submit to the President the names of any additional countries recommended for similar treatment.

(g) Notwithstanding a suspension pursuant to subsection (c) of this section or pursuant to a Presidential proclamation described in subsection (e) of this section, the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security may, on a case-by-case basis, and when in the national interest, issue visas or other immigration benefits to nationals of countries for which visas and benefits are otherwise blocked.

(h) The Secretaries of State and Homeland Security shall submit to the President a joint report on the progress in implementing this order within 30 days of the date of this order, a second report within 60 days of the date of this order, a third report within 90 days of the date of this order, and a fourth report within 120 days of the date of this order.

Sec. 4. *Implementing Uniform Screening Standards for All Immigration Programs.* (a) The Secretary of State, the Secretary of Homeland Security, the Director of National Intelligence, and the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation shall implement a program as part of the adjudication process for immigration benefits to identify individuals seeking to enter the United States on a fraudulent basis with the intent to cause harm, or who are at risk of causing harm

subsequent to their admission. This program will include the development of uniform screening standards and procedures, such as in-person interviews; the creation of a database of identity documents proffered by applicants to ensure that duplicate documents are not used by multiple applicants; amended application forms that include questions aimed at identifying fraudulent answers and malicious intent; a mechanism to ensure that the applicant is who the applicant claims to be; a process to evaluate the applicant's likelihood of becoming a positively contributing member of society and the applicant's ability to make contributions to the national interest; and a mechanism to assess whether or not the applicant has the intent to commit criminal or terrorist acts after entering the United States.

(b) The Secretary of Homeland Security, in conjunction with the Secretary of State, the Director of National Intelligence, and the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, shall submit to the President an initial report on the progress of this directive within 60 days of the date of this order, a second report within 100 days of the date of this order, and a third report within 200 days of the date of this order.

Sec. 5. *Realignment of the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program for Fiscal Year 2017.* (a) The Secretary of State shall suspend the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program (USRAP) for 120 days. During the 120-day period, the Secretary of State, in conjunction with the Secretary of Homeland Security and in consultation with the Director of National Intelligence, shall review the USRAP application and adjudication process to determine what additional procedures should be taken to ensure that those approved for refugee admission do not pose a threat to the security and welfare of the United States, and shall implement such additional procedures. Refugee applicants who are already in the USRAP process may be admitted upon the initiation and completion of these revised procedures. Upon the date that is 120 days after this order, the Secretary of State shall resume USRAP admissions only for nationals of countries for which the Secretary of State, the Secretary of Homeland Security, and the Director of National Intelligence have jointly determined such additional procedures are adequate to ensure the security and welfare of the United States.

(b) Upon the resumption of USRAP admissions, the Secretary of State, in consultation with the Secretary of Homeland Security, is further directed to make changes, to the extent permitted by law, to prioritize refugee claims made by individuals on the basis of religious-based persecution, provided that the religion of the individual is a minority religion in the individual's country of nationality. Where necessary and appropriate, the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security shall recommend legislation to the President that would assist with such prioritization.

(c) Pursuant to section 212(f) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182(f), I hereby proclaim that the entry of nationals of Syria as refugees is detrimental to the interests of the United States and thus suspend any such entry until such time as I have determined that sufficient changes have been made to the USRAP to ensure that admission of Syrian refugees is consistent with the national interest.

(d) Pursuant to section 212(f) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182(f), I hereby proclaim that the entry of more than 50,000 refugees in fiscal year 2017 would be detrimental to the interests of the United States, and thus suspend any such entry until such time as I determine that additional admissions would be in the national interest.

(e) Notwithstanding the temporary suspension imposed pursuant to subsection (a) of this section, the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security may admit individuals to the United States as refugees on a case-by-case basis, in their discretion, but only so long as they determine that the

admission of such individuals as refugees is in the national interest, would not pose a risk to the security or welfare of the United States, and one of the following conditions are met:

(i) The person is a religious minority in his or her country of nationality facing religious persecution; or

(ii) Admitting the person would enable the United States to conform its conduct to a preexisting international agreement.

(f) The Secretary of State shall submit to the President an initial report on the progress of the directive in subsection (b) of this section regarding prioritization of claims made by individuals on the basis of religious-based persecution within 100 days of the date of this order and shall submit a second report within 200 days of the date of this order.

(g) It is the policy of the executive branch that, to the extent permitted by law and as practicable, state and local jurisdictions be granted authority over the placement or settlement in their jurisdictions of aliens eligible to be admitted to the United States as refugees. To that end, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall examine existing law to determine the extent to which, consistent with applicable law, state and local jurisdictions may have greater involvement in the process of determining the placement or resettlement of refugees in their jurisdictions, and shall devise a proposal to lawfully promote such involvement.

Sec. 6. *Rescission of Exercise of Authority Relating to the Terrorism Grounds of Inadmissibility.* The Secretaries of State and Homeland Security shall, in consultation with the Attorney General, consider rescinding the exercises of authority in section 212 of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182, relating to the terrorism grounds of inadmissibility, as well as any related implementing memoranda.

Sec. 7. *Expedited Completion of the Biometric Entry-Exit Tracking System.* (a) The Secretary of Homeland Security shall expedite the completion and implementation of a biometric entry-exit tracking system for all travelers to the United States, as recommended by the National Commission on Terrorist Attacks Upon the United States.

(b) The Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit to the President periodic reports on the progress of the directive contained in subsection (a) of this section. The initial report shall be submitted within 100 days of the date of this order, a second report shall be submitted within 200 days of the date of this order, and a third report shall be submitted within 365 days of the date of this order. Further, the Secretary shall submit a report every 180 days thereafter until the system is fully deployed and operational.

Sec. 8. *Visa Interview Security.* (a) The Secretary of State shall immediately suspend the Visa Interview Waiver Program and ensure compliance with section 222 of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1222, which requires that all individuals seeking a nonimmigrant visa undergo an in-person interview, subject to specific statutory exceptions.

(b) To the extent permitted by law and subject to the availability of appropriations, the Secretary of State shall immediately expand the Consular Fellows Program, including by substantially increasing the number of Fellows, lengthening or making permanent the period of service, and making language training at the Foreign Service Institute available to Fellows for assignment to posts outside of their area of core linguistic ability, to ensure that non-immigrant visa-interview wait times are not unduly affected.

Sec. 9. *Visa Validity Reciprocity.* The Secretary of State shall review all nonimmigrant visa reciprocity agreements to ensure that they are, with respect to each visa classification, truly reciprocal insofar as practicable with respect to validity period and fees, as required by sections 221(c) and 281 of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1201(c) and 1351, and other treatment. If a country does not treat U.S. nationals seeking nonimmigrant visas in a reciprocal manner, the Secretary of State shall adjust the visa validity period, fee schedule, or other treatment to match the treatment of U.S. nationals by the foreign country, to the extent practicable.

Sec. 10. *Transparency and Data Collection.* To be more transparent with the American people, and to more effectively implement policies and practices that serve the national interest, the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Attorney General, shall, consistent with applicable law and national security, collect and make publicly available within 180 days, and every 180 days thereafter:

(a) information regarding the number of foreign nationals in the United States who have been charged with terrorism-related offenses while in the United States; convicted of terrorism-related offenses while in the United States; or removed from the United States based on terrorism-related activity, affiliation, or material support to a terrorism-related organization, or any other national security reasons since the last reporting period;

(b) information regarding the number of foreign nationals in the United States who have been radicalized after entry into the United States and engaged in terrorism-related acts, or who have provided material support to terrorism-related organizations in countries that pose a threat to the United States, since the last reporting period; and

(c) information regarding the number and types of acts of gender-based violence against women, including honor killings, in the United States by foreign nationals, since the last reporting period; and

(d) any other information relevant to public safety and security as determined by the Secretary of Homeland Security and the Attorney General, including information on the immigration status of foreign nationals charged with major offenses.

Sec. 11. *General Provisions.* (a) Nothing in this order shall be construed to impair or otherwise affect:

(i) the authority granted by law to an executive department or agency, or the head thereof; or

(ii) the functions of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget relating to budgetary, administrative, or legislative proposals.

(b) This order shall be implemented consistent with applicable law and subject to the availability of appropriations.

(c) This order is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the United States, its departments, agencies, or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.
