I am contacting you in my capacity as the AILA Washington Chapter CBP Liaison Chair. Could you please describe the impact of the Executive Order signed January 27, 2017, banning entry of Syrian refugees and banning persons from certain countries? We are inquiring so that we can inform our members and the public about who may seek entry. Here are a few specific questions:

· The EO does not name any specific countries, but covers "aliens from countries referred to in section 217(a)(12) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1187(a)(12)." That law only lists Iraq and Syria, but we have heard that 7 countries are covered: Iran, Iraq, Sudan, Somalia, Syria, Yemen and Libya. Which countries are covered?

· Does the EO apply to green card holders?

· Does it apply to persons, with approved nonimmigrant employment status, such as H-1B, L-1, O-1, etc.

· Does it apply to F-1 and OPT authorized students already attending college or working?

· If someone arrives at SeaTac and the EO applies to the person, will they be detained, deemed inadmissible, and then sent back to country from which they came?

· Will CBP exercise parole authority or agree to admit some persons on a case-by-case basis?

We understand that you might not have answers to all of these questions at this time, but we would appreciate having any answers than you can provide. If we are able to share the information, we expect that it could alleviate some burden on you and your staff.

Until further guidance is provided if you encounter a non-immigrant alien subject to the EO, you may consider requesting a waiver from C-1 through the DFO. The port will conduct a (b)(7)(E) consideration for a waiver pursuant to Section 3(g) or 5(a) as appropriate. In considering a waiver you will need to consider if it is in the best interest of the U.S., not granting the waiver would cause an undue hardship or have significant compelling reasons. Examples could include returning students, seeking medical treatment in the U.S., not someone who wants to go to K-Mart for the sales.

If you are considering a waiver please contact the DFO or myself for guidance, I attached an example of the format that will be used to request the waiver. Once the DFO has concurred with the request she will coordinate with HQ to seek approval from C-1 which could take hours to minutes considering the time of day it was requested.

On January 27, 2017, President Donald Trump issued Executive Order: Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States. It is the policy of the United States to protect its citizens from foreign nationals who intend to commit terrorist attacks in the United States; and to prevent the admission of foreign nationals who intend to exploit United States immigration laws for malevolent purposes.

As we push forward in our efforts to protect our Nation, OFO Operations will require daily reporting on our activities as related to this Executive Order. Reporting will include encounters in the air, land and sea environments with anyone who arrives into the U.S. from the seven (7) countries (Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen) that meets the criteria outlined in the Executive Order and the instructions issued to the field by Admissibility and Passenger Programs.

Using the attached spreadsheet, data should be captured daily for the 24-hour time period beginning at 0300 (EST) – and ending at 0259 hours (EST). By 0500 hours (EST) daily, each Field Office is required to submit their data from the previous 24-hours to OFO Field Liaison (b)(7)(E)

The Port of Seattle (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) called me and stated that Governor Jay Inslee was with her and requested to speak to me. Out of respect I took the call, the Governor wanted me to give him a briefing about the status of passengers that arrived today, what we expect for tomorrow and their classifications. I told the Governor that I could not provide him with the impact that we expect tomorrow, and we only encountered 5 passengers that may have been affected by the Executive Order. I told him that I could not provide him with specific about those passengers or their classifications. When pressed I told the Governor that the passengers for today could have fallen into one of the following categories non-immigrant B1/2 visitor, first time immigrant, legal permanent resident and/or all immigrant classes of admission. He asked if he was a legal permanent resident and a citizen of one the countries would he be subject of the executive order, and I responded yes. Again he requested breakdown of the travelers processed today to include their status and for tomorrow. I informed him that I could not provide that information, and his office would have to make a formal request through the CBP Office of Congressional Affairs, and he stated he is making his formal request through me. I acknowledge his request and told him I would let my chain of command know, and I re-advised him that his office would have to make the request through CBP Congressional Affairs.

Area Port Directors – just want to update you on the latest guidance on how to process aliens who are subject to the Executive Order. Until further guidance is provided if you encounter a non-immigrant alien subject to the EO, you may consider requesting a waiver from C-1 through the DFO. The port will conduct a (b)(7)(E) (b)(7)(E) consideration for a waiver pursuant to Section 3(g) or 5(a) as appropriate. In considering a waiver you will need to consider if it is in the best interest of the U.S., not granting the waiver would cause an undue hardship or have significant compelling reasons. Examples could include returning students, seeking medical treatment in the U.S., not someone who wants to go to K-Mart for the sales.

If you are considering a waiver please contact the DFO or myself for guidance, I attached an example of the format that will be used to request the waiver. Once the DFO has concurred with the request she will coordinate with HQ to seek approval from C-1 which could take hours to minutes considering the time of day it was requested.

Please continue to send your 3 times a day matrix on time and ensure they are sent to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and myself.

Until further guidance is provided if you encounter a non-immigrant alien subject to the EO, you may consider requesting a waiver from C-1 through the DFO. The port will conduct a (b)(7)(E)

consideration for a waiver pursuant to Section 3(g) or 5(a) as appropriate. In considering a waiver you will need to consider if it is in the best interest of the U.S., not granting the waiver would cause an undue hardship or have significant compelling reasons. Examples could include returning students, seeking medical treatment in the U.S., not someone who wants to go to K-Mart for the sales.

If you are considering a waiver please contact the DFO or myself for guidance, I attached an example of the format that will be used to request the waiver. Once the DFO has concurred with the request she will coordinate with HQ to seek approval from C-1 which could take hours to minutes considering the time of day it was requested.

On January 27, 2017, President Donald Trump issued Executive Order: Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States. It is the policy of the United States to protect its citizens from foreign nationals who intend to commit terrorist attacks in the United States; and to prevent the admission of foreign nationals who intend to exploit United States immigration laws for malevolent purposes.

As we push forward in our efforts to protect our Nation, OFO Operations will require daily reporting on our activities as related to this Executive Order. Reporting will include encounters in the air, land and sea environments with anyone who arrives into the U.S. from the seven (7) countries (Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen) that meets the criteria outlined in the Executive Order and the instructions issued to the field by Admissibility and Passenger Programs.

Using the attached spreadsheet, data should be captured daily for the 24-hour time period beginning at 0300 (EST) – and ending at 0259 hours (EST). By 0500 hours (EST) daily, each Field Office is required to submit their data from the previous 24-hours to OFO Field Liaison (b)(7)(E). Reports must be submitting using the attached Microsoft Excel template document. Field Liaison will consolidate these reports into a final report senior CBP and DHS leadership.

PROTECTING THE NATION FROM FOREIGN TERRORIST
ENTRY INTO THE UNITED STATES

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and laws of the United States of America, including the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), 8 U.S.C. 1101 *et seq.*, and section 301 of title 3, United States Code, and to protect the American people from terrorist attacks by foreign nationals admitted to the United States, it is hereby ordered as follows:

Section 1. Purpose. The visa-issuance process plays a crucial role in detecting individuals with terrorist ties and stopping them from entering the United States. Perhaps in no instance was that more apparent than the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, when State Department policy prevented consular officers from properly scrutinizing the visa applications of several of the 19 foreign nationals who went on to murder nearly 3,000 Americans. And while the visa-issuance process was reviewed and amended after the September 11 attacks to better detect would-be terrorists from receiving visas, these measures did not stop attacks by foreign nationals who were admitted to the United States.

Numerous foreign-born individuals have been convicted or implicated in terrorism-related crimes since September 11, 2001, including foreign nationals who entered the United States after receiving visitor, student, or employment visas, or who entered through the United States refugee resettlement program. Deteriorating conditions in certain countries due to war, strife, disaster, and civil unrest increase the likelihood that terrorists will use any means possible to enter the United States. The United States must be vigilant during the visa-issuance process to ensure that those approved for admission do not intend to harm Americans and that they have no ties to terrorism.

In order to protect Americans, the United States must ensure that those admitted to this country do not bear hostile attitudes toward it and its founding principles. The United States cannot, and should not, admit those who do not support the Constitution, or those who would place violent ideologies over American law. In addition, the United States should not admit those who engage in acts of bigotry or hatred (including "honor" killings, other forms of violence against women, or the persecution of those who practice religions different from their own) or those who would oppress Americans of any race, gender, or sexual orientation.

Sec. 2. Policy. It is the policy of the United States to protect its citizens from foreign nationals who intend to commit terrorist attacks in the United States; and to prevent the admission of foreign nationals who intend to exploit United States immigration laws for malevolent purposes.

Sec. 3. Suspension of Issuance of Visas and Other Immigration Benefits to Nationals of Countries of Particular Concern. (a) The Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of State and the Director of National Intelligence, shall immediately conduct a review to determine the information needed from any country to adjudicate any visa, admission, or other benefit under the INA (adjudications) in order to determine that the individual seeking the benefit is who the individual claims to be and is not a security or public-safety threat.

(b) The Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of State and the Director of National Intelligence, shall submit to the President a report on the results of the review described in subsection (a) of this section, including the Secretary of Homeland Security's determination of the information needed for adjudications and a list of countries that do not provide adequate information, within 30 days of the date of this order. The Secretary of Homeland Security shall provide a copy of the report to the Secretary of State and the Director of National Intelligence.

(c) To temporarily reduce investigative burdens on relevant agencies during the review period described in subsection (a) of this section, to ensure the proper review and maximum utilization of available resources for the screening of foreign nationals, and to ensure that adequate standards are established to prevent infiltration by foreign terrorists or criminals, pursuant to section 212(f) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182(f), I hereby proclaim that the immigrant and nonimmigrant entry into the United States of aliens from countries referred to in section 217(a)(12) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1187(a)(12), would be detrimental to the interests of the United States, and I hereby suspend entry into the United States, as immigrants and nonimmigrants, of such persons for 90 days from the date of this order (excluding those foreign nationals traveling on diplomatic visas, North Atlantic Treaty Organization visas, C-2 visas for travel to the United Nations, and G-1, G-2, G-3, and G-4 visas).

(d) Immediately upon receipt of the report described in subsection (b) of this section regarding the information needed for adjudications, the Secretary of State shall request all foreign governments that do not supply such information to start providing such information regarding their nationals within 60 days of notification.

(e) After the 60-day period described in subsection (d) of this section expires, the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of State, shall submit to the President a list of countries recommended for inclusion on a Presidential proclamation that would prohibit the entry of foreign nationals (excluding those foreign nationals traveling on diplomatic visas, North Atlantic Treaty Organization visas, C-2 visas for travel to the United Nations, and G-1, G-2, G-3, and G-4 visas) from countries that do not provide the

information requested pursuant to subsection (d) of this section until compliance occurs.

(f) At any point after submitting the list described in subsection (e) of this section, the Secretary of State or the Secretary of Homeland Security may submit to the President the names of any additional countries recommended for similar treatment.

(g) Notwithstanding a suspension pursuant to subsection (c) of this section or pursuant to a Presidential proclamation described in subsection (e) of this section, the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security may, on a case-by-case basis, and when in the national interest, issue visas or other immigration benefits to nationals of countries for which visas and benefits are otherwise blocked.

(h) The Secretaries of State and Homeland Security shall submit to the President a joint report on the progress in implementing this order within 30 days of the date of this order, a second report within 60 days of the date of this order, a third report within 90 days of the date of this order, and a fourth report within 120 days of the date of this order.

Sec. 4. Implementing Uniform Screening Standards for All Immigration Programs. (a) The Secretary of State, the Secretary of Homeland Security, the Director of National Intelligence, and the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation shall implement a program, as part of the adjudication process for immigration benefits, to identify individuals seeking to enter the United States on a fraudulent basis with the intent to cause harm, or who are at risk of causing harm subsequent to their admission. This program will include the development of a uniform screening standard and procedure, such as in-person interviews; a database of identity documents proffered by applicants to ensure that duplicate documents are not used by multiple applicants; amended application forms that include questions aimed at identifying fraudulent answers and malicious intent; a mechanism to ensure that the applicant is who the applicant claims to be; a process to evaluate the applicant's likelihood of becoming a positively contributing member of society and the applicant's ability to make contributions to the national interest; and a mechanism to assess whether or not the applicant has the intent to commit criminal or terrorist acts after entering the United States.

(b) The Secretary of Homeland Security, in conjunction with the Secretary of State, the Director of National Intelligence, and the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, shall submit to the President an initial report on the progress of this directive within 60 days of the date of this order, a second report within 100 days of the date of this order, and a third report within 200 days of the date of this order.

Sec. 5. Realignment of the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program for Fiscal Year 2017. (a) The Secretary of State shall suspend the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program (USRAP) for 120 days. During the 120-day period, the Secretary of State, in conjunction with the Secretary of Homeland Security and in consultation with the Director of National Intelligence, shall

review the USRAP application and adjudication process to determine what additional procedures should be taken to ensure that those approved for refugee admission do not pose a threat to the security and welfare of the United States, and shall implement such additional procedures. Refugee applicants who are already in the USRAP process may be admitted upon the initiation and completion of these revised procedures. Upon the date that is 120 days after the date of this order, the Secretary of State shall resume USRAP admissions only for nationals of countries for which the Secretary of State, the Secretary of Homeland Security, and the Director of National Intelligence have jointly determined that such additional procedures are adequate to ensure the security and welfare of the United States.

(b) Upon the resumption of USRAP admissions, the Secretary of State, in consultation with the Secretary of Homeland Security, is further directed to make changes, to the extent permitted by law, to prioritize refugee claims made by individuals on the basis of religious-based persecution, provided that the religion of the individual is a minority religion in the individual's country of nationality. Where necessary and appropriate, the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security shall recommend legislation to the President that would assist with such prioritization.

(c) Pursuant to section 212(f) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182(f), I hereby proclaim that the entry of nationals of Syria as refugees is detrimental to the interests of the United States and thus suspend any such entry until such time as I have determined that sufficient changes have been made to the USRAP to ensure that admission of Syrian refugees is consistent with the national interest.

(d) Pursuant to section 212(f) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182(f), I hereby proclaim that the entry of more than 50,000 refugees in fiscal year 2017 would be detrimental to the interests of the United States, and thus suspend any such entry until such time as I determine that additional admissions would be in the national interest.

(e) Notwithstanding the temporary suspension imposed pursuant to subsection (a) of this section, the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security may jointly determine to admit individuals to the United States as refugees on a case-by-case basis, in their discretion, but only so long as they determine that the admission of such individuals as refugees is in the national interest -- including when the person is a religious minority in his country of nationality facing religious persecution, when admitting the person would enable the United States to conform its conduct to a preexisting international agreement, or when the person is already in transit and denying admission would cause undue hardship -- and it would not pose a risk to the security or welfare of the United States.

(f) The Secretary of State shall submit to the President an initial report on the progress of the directive in subsection (b) of this section regarding prioritization of claims made by individuals on the basis of religious-based persecution within 100 days of the date of this order and shall submit a second report within 200 days of the date of this order.

(g) It is the policy of the executive branch that, to the extent permitted by law and as practicable, State and local jurisdictions be granted a role in the process of determining the placement or settlement in their jurisdictions of aliens eligible to be admitted to the United States as refugees. To that end, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall examine existing law to determine the extent to which, consistent with applicable law, State and local jurisdictions may have greater involvement in the process of determining the placement or resettlement of refugees in their jurisdictions, and shall devise a proposal to lawfully promote such involvement.

Sec. 6. Rescission of Exercise of Authority Relating to the Terrorism Grounds of Inadmissibility. The Secretaries of State and Homeland Security shall, in consultation with the Attorney General, consider rescinding the exercises of authority in section 212 of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182, relating to the terrorism grounds of inadmissibility, as well as any related implementing memoranda.

Sec. 7. Expedited Completion of the Biometric Entry-Exit Tracking System. (a) The Secretary of Homeland Security shall expedite the completion and implementation of a biometric entry-exit tracking system for all travelers to the United States, as recommended by the National Commission on Terrorist Attacks Upon the United States.

(b) The Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit to the President periodic reports on the progress of the directive contained in subsection (a) of this section. The initial report shall be submitted within 100 days of the date of this order, a second report shall be submitted within 200 days of the date of this order, and a third report shall be submitted within 365 days of the date of this order. Further, the Secretary shall submit a report every 180 days thereafter until the system is fully deployed and operational.

Sec. 8. Visa Interview Security. (a) The Secretary of State shall immediately suspend the Visa Interview Waiver Program and ensure compliance with section 222 of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1222, which requires that all individuals seeking a nonimmigrant visa undergo an in-person interview, subject to specific statutory exceptions.

(b) To the extent permitted by law and subject to the availability of appropriations, the Secretary of State shall immediately expand the Consular Fellows Program, including by substantially increasing the number of Fellows, lengthening or making permanent the period of service, and making language training at the Foreign Service Institute available to Fellows for assignment to posts outside of their area of core linguistic ability, to ensure that non-immigrant visa-interview wait times are not unduly affected.

Sec. 9. Visa Validity Reciprocity. The Secretary of State shall review all nonimmigrant visa reciprocity agreements to ensure that they are, with respect to each visa classification, truly reciprocal insofar as practicable with respect to validity period and fees, as required by sections 221(c) and 281 of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1201(c) and 1351, and other treatment. If a country does not treat United States nationals seeking

nonimmigrant visas in a reciprocal manner, the Secretary of State shall adjust the visa validity period, fee schedule, or other treatment to match the treatment of United States nationals by the foreign country, to the extent practicable.

Sec. 10. Transparency and Data Collection. (a) To be more transparent with the American people, and to more effectively implement policies and practices that serve the national interest, the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Attorney General, shall, consistent with applicable law and national security, collect and make publicly available within 180 days, and every 180 days thereafter:

(i) information regarding the number of foreign nationals in the United States who have been charged with terrorism-related offenses while in the United States; convicted of terrorism-related offenses while in the United States; or removed from the United States based on terrorism-related activity, affiliation, or material support to a terrorism-related organization, or any other national security reasons since the date of this order or the last reporting period, whichever is later;

(ii) information regarding the number of foreign nationals in the United States who have been radicalized after entry into the United States and engaged in terrorism-related acts, or who have provided material support to terrorism-related organizations in countries that pose a threat to the United States, since the date of this order or the last reporting period, whichever is later; and

(iii) information regarding the number and types of acts of gender-based violence against women, including honor killings, in the United States by foreign nationals, since the date of this order or the last reporting period, whichever is later; and

(iv) any other information relevant to public safety and security as determined by the Secretary of Homeland Security and the Attorney General, including information on the immigration status of foreign nationals charged with major offenses.

(b) The Secretary of State shall, within one year of the date of this order, provide a report on the estimated long-term costs of the USRAP at the Federal, State, and local levels.

Sec. 11. General Provisions. (a) Nothing in this order shall be construed to impair or otherwise affect:

(i) the authority granted by law to an executive department or agency, or the head thereof; or

(ii) the functions of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget relating to budgetary, administrative, or legislative proposals.

(b) This order shall be implemented consistent with applicable law and subject to the availability of appropriations.

(c) This order is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the United States, its departments, agencies, or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.

Executive Order—Protecting the Nation from Terrorist Entry into the United States by Foreign Nationals EXECUTIVE ORDER

PROTECTING THE NATION FROM TERRORIST ENTRY INTO THE UNITED STATES BY FOREIGN NATIONALS

Numerous foreign-born individuals have been convicted or implicated in terrorism-related crimes since September 11, 2001, including foreign nationals who entered the United States after receiving visitor, student, or employment visas, or who entered through the U.S. refugee resettlement program. The Secretary of State shall review all nonimmigrant visa reciprocity agreements to ensure that they are, with respect to each visa classification, truly reciprocal insofar as practicable with respect to validity period and fees, as required by sections 221(c) and 281 of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1201(c) and 1351, and other treatment. If a country does not treat U.S. nationals seeking nonimmigrant visas in a reciprocal manner, the Secretary of State shall adjust the visa validity period, fee schedule, or other treatment to match the treatment of U.S. nationals by the foreign country, to the extent practicable.

Sec. 10. Transparency and Data Collection. To be more transparent with the American people, and to more effectively implement policies and practices that serve the national interest, the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Attorney General, shall, consistent with applicable law and national security, collect and make publicly available within 180 days, and every 180 days thereafter:

(a) information regarding the number of foreign nationals in the United States who have been charged with terrorism-related offenses while in the United States; convicted of terrorism-related offenses while in the United States; or removed from the United States based on terrorism-related activity, affiliation, or material support to a terrorism-related organization, or any other national security reasons since the last reporting period;

(b) information regarding the number of foreign nationals in the United States who have been radicalized after entry into the United States and engaged in terrorism-related acts, or who have provided material support to terrorism-related organizations in countries that pose a threat to the United States, since the last reporting period; and

(c) information regarding the number and types of acts of gender-based violence against women, including honor killings, in the United States by foreign nationals, since the last reporting period; and

(d) any other information relevant to public safety and security as determined by the Secretary of Homeland Security and the Attorney General, including information on the immigration status of foreign nationals charged with major offenses.

Sec. 11. General Provisions. (a) Nothing in this order shall be construed to impair or otherwise affect:

(i) the authority granted by law to an executive department or agency, or the head thereof; or

(ii) the functions of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget relating to budgetary, administrative, or legislative proposals.

(b) This order shall be implemented consistent with applicable law and subject to the availability of appropriations.

(c) This order is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the United States, its departments, agencies, or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.

Executive Order—Protecting the Nation from Terrorist Entry into the United States by Foreign Nationals EXECUTIVE ORDER

PROTECTING THE NATION FROM TERRORIST ENTRY INTO THE UNITED STATES BY FOREIGN NATIONALS

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and laws of the United States of America, including the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), 8 U.S.C. 1101 et seq., and section 301 of title 3, United States Code, and to protect the American people from terrorist attacks by foreign nationals admitted to the United States, it is hereby ordered as follows:

Section 1. Purpose. The visa-issuance process plays a crucial role in detecting individuals with terrorist ties and stopping them from entering the United States. Perhaps in no instance was that more apparent than the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, when State Department policy prevented consular officers from properly scrutinizing the visa applications of several of the 19 foreign nationals who went on to murder nearly 3,000 Americans. And while the visa-issuance process was reviewed and amended after the September 11 attacks to better detect would-be terrorists from receiving visas, these measures did not stop attacks by foreign nationals who were admitted to the United States.

Numerous foreign-born individuals have been convicted or implicated in terrorism-related crimes since September 11, 2001, including foreign nationals who entered the United States after receiving visitor, student, or employment visas, or who entered through the U.S. refugee resettlement program. Deteriorating conditions in certain countries due to war, strife, disaster, and civil unrest increase the likelihood that terrorists will use any means possible to enter the United States. The United States must be vigilant during the visa-issuance process to ensure that those approved for admission do not intend to harm Americans and that they have no ties to terrorism.

In order to protect Americans, the United States must ensure that those admitted to this country do not bear hostile attitudes toward it and its founding principles. We cannot, and should not, admit into our country those who do not support the U.S. Constitution, or those who would place violent ideologies over American law. In addition, the United States should not admit those who engage in acts of bigotry or hatred (including “honor” killings, other forms of violence against women, or the persecution of those who practice religions different from their own) or those who would oppress Americans of any race, gender, or sexual orientation.

Sec. 2. Policy. It is the policy of the United States to protect its citizens from foreign nationals who intend to commit terrorist attacks in the United States; and to prevent the admission of foreign nationals who intend to exploit United States immigration laws for malevolent purposes.

Sec. 3. Suspension of Issuance of Visas and Other Immigration Benefits to Nationals of Countries of Particular Concern.

(a) The Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of State and the Director of National Intelligence, shall immediately conduct a review to determine the information needed from any country for adjudication of any visa, admission, or other benefit under the INA (adjudications) to determine that the individual seeking the benefit is who the individual claims to be and is not a security or public-safety threat.

(b) The Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of State and the Director of National Intelligence, shall submit to the President a report on the results of the review described in subsection (a) of this section, including the Secretary of Homeland Security's determination of the information needed for adjudications and a list of countries that do not provide adequate information, within 30 days of the date of this order. The Secretary of Homeland Security shall provide a copy of the report to the Secretary of State and Director of National Intelligence.

(c) To temporarily reduce investigative burdens on relevant agencies during the review period described in subsection (a) of this section, to ensure the proper review and maximum utilization of available resources for the screening of foreign nationals, and to ensure that adequate standards are established to prevent the terrorist or criminal infiltration of foreign nationals, pursuant to section 212(f) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182(f), I hereby proclaim that the immigrant and nonimmigrant entry into the United States of aliens from countries referred to in section 217(a)(12) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1187(a)(12), would be detrimental to the interests of the United States, and I hereby suspend entry into the United States, as immigrants and nonimmigrants, of such persons for 90 days from the date of this order (excluding those foreign nationals traveling on diplomatic visas, North Atlantic Treaty Organization visas, and C-2 visas for travel to the United Nations).

(d) Immediately upon receipt of the report described in subsection (b) of this section regarding the information needed for adjudications, the Secretary of State shall request all foreign governments that do not supply such information to start providing such information regarding their nationals within 60 days of notification.

(e) After the 60-day period described in subsection (d) of this section expires, the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of State, shall submit to the President a list of countries recommended for inclusion on a Presidential proclamation that would prohibit the entry of foreign nationals (excluding those foreign nationals traveling on diplomatic visas, North Atlantic Treaty Organization visas, and C-2 visas for travel to the United Nations) from countries that do not provide the information requested pursuant to subsection (d) of this section until compliance occurs.

(f) At any point after submitting the list described in subsection (e) of this section, the Secretary of State or the Secretary of Homeland Security may submit to the President the names of any additional countries recommended for similar treatment.

(g) Notwithstanding a suspension pursuant to subsection (c) of this section or pursuant to a Presidential proclamation described in subsection (e) of this section, the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security may, on a case-by-case basis, and when in the national interest, issue visas or other immigration benefits to nationals of countries for which visas and benefits are otherwise blocked.

(h) The Secretaries of State and Homeland Security shall submit to the President a joint report on the progress in implementing this order within 30 days of the date of this order, a second report within 60 days of the date of this order, a third report within 90 days of the date of this order, and a fourth report within 120 days of the date of this order.

Sec. 4. Implementing Uniform Screening Standards for All Immigration Programs. (a) The Secretary of State, the Secretary of Homeland Security, the Director of National Intelligence, and the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation shall implement a program as part of the adjudication process for immigration benefits to identify individuals seeking to enter the United States on a fraudulent basis with the intent to cause harm, or who are at risk of causing harm subsequent to their admission. This program will include the development of uniform screening standards and procedures, such as in-person interviews; the creation of a database of identity documents proffered by applicants

to ensure that duplicate documents are not used by multiple applicants; amended application forms that include questions aimed at identifying fraudulent answers and malicious intent; a mechanism to ensure that the applicant is who the applicant claims to be; a process to evaluate the applicant's likelihood of becoming a positively contributing member of society and the applicant's ability to make contributions to the national interest; and a mechanism to assess whether or not the applicant has the intent to commit criminal or terrorist acts after entering the United States.

(b) The Secretary of Homeland Security, in conjunction with the Secretary of State, the Director of National Intelligence, and the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, shall submit to the President an initial report on the progress of this directive within 60 days of the date of this order, a second report within 100 days of the date of this order, and a third report within 200 days of the date of this order.

Sec. 5. Realignment of the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program for Fiscal Year 2017. (a) The Secretary of State shall suspend the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program (USRAP) for 120 days. During the 120-day period, the Secretary of State, in conjunction with the Secretary of Homeland Security and in consultation with the Director of National Intelligence, shall review the USRAP application and adjudication process to determine what additional procedures should be taken to ensure that those approved for refugee admission do not pose a threat to the security and welfare of the United States, and shall implement such additional procedures. Refugee applicants who are already in the USRAP process may be admitted upon the initiation and completion of these revised procedures. Upon the date that is 120 days after this order, the Secretary of State shall resume USRAP admissions only for nationals of countries for which the Secretary of State, the Secretary of Homeland Security, and the Director of National Intelligence have jointly determined such additional procedures are adequate to ensure the security and welfare of the United States.

(b) Upon the resumption of USRAP admissions, the Secretary of State, in consultation with the Secretary of Homeland Security, is further directed to make changes, to the extent permitted by law, to prioritize refugee claims made by individuals on the basis of religious-based persecution, provided that the religion of the individual is a minority religion in the individual's country of nationality. Where necessary and appropriate, the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security shall recommend legislation to the President that would assist with such prioritization.

(c) Pursuant to section 212(f) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182(f), I hereby proclaim that the entry of nationals of Syria as refugees is detrimental to the interests of the United States and thus suspend any such entry until such time as I have determined that sufficient changes have been made to the USRAP to ensure that admission of Syrian refugees is consistent with the national interest.

(d) Pursuant to section 212(f) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182(f), I hereby proclaim that the entry of more than 50,000 refugees in fiscal year 2017 would be detrimental to the interests of the United States, and thus suspend any such entry until such time as I determine that additional admissions would be in the national interest.

(e) Notwithstanding the temporary suspension imposed pursuant to subsection (a) of this section, the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security may admit individuals to the United States as refugees on a case-by-case basis, in their discretion, but only so long as they determine that the admission of such individuals as refugees is in the national interest, would not pose a risk to the security or welfare of the United States, and one of the following conditions are met:

(i) The person is a religious minority in his or her country of nationality facing religious persecution; or

(ii) Admitting the person would enable the United States to conform its conduct to a preexisting international agreement.

(f) The Secretary of State shall submit to the President an initial report on the progress of the directive in subsection (b) of this section regarding prioritization of claims made by individuals on the basis of religious-based persecution within 100 days of the date of this order and shall submit a second report within 200 days of the date of this order.

(g) It is the policy of the executive branch that, to the extent permitted by law and as practicable, state and local jurisdictions be granted authority over the placement or settlement in their jurisdictions of aliens eligible to be admitted to the United States as refugees. To that end, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall examine existing law to determine the extent to which, consistent with applicable law, state and local jurisdictions may have greater involvement in the process of determining the placement or resettlement of refugees in their jurisdictions, and shall devise a proposal to lawfully promote such involvement.

The Secretaries of State and Homeland Security shall, in consultation with the Attorney General, consider rescinding the exercises of authority in section 212 of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182, relating to the terrorism grounds of inadmissibility, as well as any related implementing memoranda.

Sec. 7. Expedited Completion of the Biometric Entry-Exit Tracking System. (a) The Secretary of Homeland Security shall expedite the completion and implementation of a biometric entry-exit tracking system for all travelers to the United States, as recommended by the National Commission on Terrorist Attacks Upon the United States.

(d) Immediately upon receipt of the report described in subsection (b) of this section regarding the information needed for adjudications, the Secretary of State shall request all foreign governments that do not supply such information to start providing such information regarding their nationals within 60 days of notification.

(e) After the 60-day period described in subsection (d) of this section expires, the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of State, shall submit to the President a list of countries recommended for inclusion on a Presidential proclamation that would prohibit the entry of foreign nationals (excluding those foreign nationals traveling on diplomatic visas, North Atlantic Treaty Organization visas, and C-2 visas for travel to the United Nations) from countries that do not provide the information requested pursuant to subsection (d) of this section until compliance occurs.

(f) At any point after submitting the list described in subsection (e) of this section, the Secretary of State or the Secretary of Homeland Security may submit to the President the names of any additional countries recommended for similar treatment.

(g) Notwithstanding a suspension pursuant to subsection (c) of this section or pursuant to a Presidential proclamation described in subsection (e) of this section, the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security may, on a case-by-case basis, and when in the national interest, issue visas or other immigration benefits to nationals of countries for which visas and benefits are otherwise blocked.

(h) The Secretaries of State and Homeland Security shall submit to the President a joint report on the progress in implementing this order within 30 days of the date of this order, a second report within 60 days of the date of this order, a third report within 90 days of the date of this order, and a fourth report within 120 days of the date of this order.

Sec. 4. Implementing Uniform Screening Standards for All Immigration Programs. (a) The Secretary of State, the Secretary of Homeland Security, the Director of National Intelligence, and the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation shall implement a program as part of the adjudication process for immigration benefits to identify individuals seeking to enter the United States on a fraudulent basis with the intent to cause harm, or who are at risk of causing harm subsequent to their admission. This program will include the development of uniform screening standards and procedures, such as in-person interviews; the creation of a database of identity documents proffered by applicants to ensure that duplicate documents are not used by multiple applicants; amended application forms that include questions aimed at identifying fraudulent answers and malicious intent; a mechanism to ensure that the applicant is who the applicant claims to be; a process to evaluate the applicant's likelihood of becoming a positively contributing member of society and the applicant's ability to make contributions to the national interest; and a mechanism to assess whether or not the applicant has the intent to commit criminal or terrorist acts after entering the United States.

(b) The Secretary of Homeland Security, in conjunction with the Secretary of State, the Director of National Intelligence, and the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, shall submit to the President an initial report on the progress of this directive within 60 days of the date of this order, a second report within 100 days of the date of this order, and a third report within 200 days of the date of this order.

Sec. 5. Realignment of the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program for Fiscal Year 2017. (a) The Secretary of State shall suspend the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program (USRAP) for 120 days. During the 120-day period, the Secretary of State, in conjunction with the Secretary of Homeland Security and in consultation with the Director of National Intelligence, shall review the USRAP application and adjudication process to determine what additional procedures should be taken to ensure that those approved for refugee admission do not pose a threat to the security and welfare of the United States, and shall implement such additional procedures. Refugee applicants who are already in the USRAP process may be admitted upon the initiation and completion of these revised procedures. Upon the date that is 120 days after this order, the Secretary of State shall resume USRAP admissions only for nationals of countries for which the Secretary of State, the Secretary of Homeland Security, and the Director of National Intelligence have jointly determined such additional procedures are adequate to ensure the security and welfare of the United States.

(b) Upon the resumption of USRAP admissions, the Secretary of State, in consultation with the Secretary of Homeland Security, is further directed to make changes, to the extent permitted by law, to prioritize refugee claims made by individuals on the basis of religious-based persecution, provided that the religion of the individual is a minority religion in the individual's country of nationality. Where necessary and appropriate, the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security shall recommend legislation to the President that would assist with such prioritization.

(c) Pursuant to section 212(f) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182(f), I hereby proclaim that the entry of nationals of Syria as refugees is detrimental to the interests of the United States and thus suspend any such entry until such time as I have determined that sufficient changes have been made to the USRAP to ensure that admission of Syrian refugees is consistent with the national interest.

(d) Pursuant to section 212(f) of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182(f), I hereby proclaim that the entry of more than 50,000 refugees in fiscal year 2017 would be detrimental to the interests of the United States, and thus suspend any such entry until such time as I determine that additional admissions would be in the national interest.

(e) Notwithstanding the temporary suspension imposed pursuant to subsection (a) of this section, the Secretaries of State and Homeland Security may admit individuals to the United States as refugees on a case-by-case basis, in their discretion, but only so long as they determine that the admission of such individuals as refugees is in the national

interest, would not pose a risk to the security or welfare of the United States, and one of the following conditions are met:

- (i) The person is a religious minority in his or her country of nationality facing religious persecution; or
 - (ii) Admitting the person would enable the United States to conform its conduct to a preexisting international agreement.
- (f) The Secretary of State shall submit to the President an initial report on the progress of the directive in subsection (b) of this section regarding prioritization of claims made by individuals on the basis of religious-based persecution within 100 days of the date of this order and shall submit a second report within 200 days of the date of this order.
- (g) It is the policy of the executive branch that, to the extent permitted by law and as practicable, state and local jurisdictions be granted authority over the placement or settlement in their jurisdictions of aliens eligible to be admitted to the United States as refugees. To that end, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall examine existing law to determine the extent to which, consistent with applicable law, state and local jurisdictions may have greater involvement in the process of determining the placement or resettlement of refugees in their jurisdictions, and shall devise a proposal to lawfully promote such involvement.

Sec. 6. Rescission of Exercise of Authority Relating to the Terrorism Grounds of Inadmissibility. The Secretaries of State and Homeland Security shall, in consultation with the Attorney General, consider rescinding the exercises of authority in section 212 of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1182, relating to the terrorism grounds of inadmissibility, as well as any related implementing memoranda.

Sec. 7. Expedited Completion of the Biometric Entry-Exit Tracking System. (a) The Secretary of Homeland Security shall expedite the completion and implementation of a biometric entry-exit tracking system for all travelers to the United States, as recommended by the National Commission on Terrorist Attacks Upon the United States.

(b) The Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit to the President periodic reports on the progress of the directive contained in subsection (a) of this section. The initial report shall be submitted within 100 days of the date of this order, a second report shall be submitted within 200 days of the date of this order, and a third report shall be submitted within 365 days of the date of this order. Further, the Secretary shall submit a report every 180 days thereafter until the system is fully deployed and operational.

Sec. 8. Visa Interview Security. (a) The Secretary of State shall immediately suspend the Visa Interview Waiver Program and ensure compliance with section 222 of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1222, which requires that all individuals seeking a nonimmigrant visa undergo an in-person interview, subject to specific statutory exceptions.

(b) To the extent permitted by law and subject to the availability of appropriations, the Secretary of State shall immediately expand the Consular Fellows Program, including by substantially increasing the number of Fellows, lengthening or making permanent the period of service, and making language training at the Foreign Service Institute available to Fellows for assignment to posts outside of their area of core linguistic ability, to ensure that non-immigrant visa-interview wait times are not unduly affected.

Sec. 9. Visa Validity Reciprocity. The Secretary of State shall review all nonimmigrant visa reciprocity agreements to ensure that they are, with respect to each visa classification, truly reciprocal insofar as practicable with respect to validity period and fees, as required by sections 221(c) and 281 of the INA, 8 U.S.C. 1201(c) and 1351, and other treatment. If a country does not treat U.S. nationals seeking nonimmigrant visas in a reciprocal manner, the Secretary of

State shall adjust the visa validity period, fee schedule, or other treatment to match the treatment of U.S. nationals by the foreign country, to the extent practicable.

Sec. 10. Transparency and Data Collection. To be more transparent with the American people, and to more effectively implement policies and practices that serve the national interest, the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Attorney General, shall, consistent with applicable law and national security, collect and make publicly available within 180 days, and every 180 days thereafter:

(a) information regarding the number of foreign nationals in the United States who have been charged with terrorism-related offenses while in the United States; convicted of terrorism-related offenses while in the United States; or removed from the United States based on terrorism-related activity, affiliation, or material support to a terrorism-related organization, or any other national security reasons since the last reporting period;

(b) information regarding the number of foreign nationals in the United States who have been radicalized after entry into the United States and engaged in terrorism-related acts, or who have provided material support to terrorism-related organizations in countries that pose a threat to the United States, since the last reporting period; and

(c) information regarding the number and types of acts of gender-based violence against women, including honor killings, in the United States by foreign nationals, since the last reporting period; and

(d) any other information relevant to public safety and security as determined by the Secretary of Homeland Security and the Attorney General, including information on the immigration status of foreign nationals charged with major offenses.

Sec. 11. General Provisions. (a) Nothing in this order shall be construed to impair or otherwise affect:

(i) the authority granted by law to an executive department or agency, or the head thereof; or

(ii) the functions of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget relating to budgetary, administrative, or legislative proposals.

(b) This order shall be implemented consistent with applicable law and subject to the availability of appropriations.

(c) This order is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the United States, its departments, agencies, or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.

On January 27, 2017, President Donald Trump issued Executive Order: Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States. It is the policy of the United States to protect its citizens from foreign nationals who intend to commit terrorist attacks in the United States; and to prevent the admission of foreign nationals who intend to exploit United States immigration laws for malevolent purposes.

As we push forward in our efforts to protect our Nation, OFO Operations will require daily reporting on our activities as related to this Executive Order. Reporting will include encounters in the air, land and sea environments with anyone who arrives into the U.S. from the seven (7) countries (Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen) that meets the criteria outlined in the Executive Order and the instructions issued to the field by Admissibility and Passenger Programs.

Using the attached spreadsheet, data should be captured daily for the 24-hour time period beginning at 0300 (EST) – and ending at 0259 hours (EST). By 0500 hours (EST) daily, each Field Office is required to submit their data from the previous 24-hours to OFO Field Liaison ((b)(7)(E)) Reports must be submitting using the attached Microsoft Excel template document. Field Liaison will consolidate these reports into a final report senior CBP and DHS leadership.

1 An individual is encountered at a land border after making a wrong turn or refused from Canada and is not making entry. If they are citizens of the seven countries would they need to be vetted the same as arriving? If no derogatory information exists and their status is confirmed as valid, would they just be released? Or since their visa is considered revoked, would they need to be processed for removal? If the person is not seeking admission, then the EO would not apply.

2. The understanding is if a non immigrant presents a passport from Canada and birth in Iraq they would be allowed entry if otherwise eligible for admission. Would they still require the vetting process? If a LPR is encountered that is verified to be a Canadian citizen, but born in Iraq are they subject to the EO? POEs should inspect the person in accordance with how they present to the CBP Officer at POE.

3. We have a number of charter flights from Detroit to Mexico and the Caribbean. People typically travel for a week vacation. When we encounter a non immigrant, very often F1 students, who traveled for a short vacation and is now returning to Detroit in the same status they left but are subject to the EO, should they be returned to the location where they traveled to, or processed and turned over to ERO to be removed to their home country? The individuals subject to this EO are barred from entry regardless of where or duration outside the United States. The airline is only liable to take the alien back from whence they came but given how MX routinely doesn't accept our returns, I would recommend reaching out to ERO to ensure they will accept person and have means and mechanism to remove them from U.S.

 - At approximately 1815 hours, Area Port Director (APD) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and Assistant Area Port Director (AAPD) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) met with a congressional congregation consisting of Congresswomen Susan Del Bene and Pramilla Jayapal and various staffers and Governor Jay Inseele and Senator Patty Murray on the phone.
 - APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) informed the group that Director, Field Operations Michele James is actively trying to setup a CBP Congressional call for the group.
 - The group asked several specific questions regarding the travelers and if CBP has identified any additional travelers on future flights that will be the subject of the executive order. APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) told the group that information will be conveyed to them on the congressional call.
 - The following questions were asked and APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) informed the group that the questions will forwarded for an appropriate response.
1. Will local CBP honor the Federal Order granting the emergency motion for stay of removal of aliens?
 2. Will the traveler that was returned earlier today be allowed to return immediately because of the Federal Order and stay in the U.S. until there is a ruling?
 3. Where will the two that were just removed from the Emirates flight be housed until a ruling on the legal sufficiency of the Executive Order can be determined? Will they stay at Sea-Tac and if so, do you have the appropriate facilities here?
 4. Northwest Immigrant Rights Project is the legal representative for the two travelers, and they gave CBP legal representation information and asked CBP to provide it to the travelers. In addition, they wanted to know when they can meet with their clients.
 5. Will anyone else that arrives be allowed to stay in the Washington State until a ruling is made on the Executive Order?
 6. Demanding the number of travelers expected to arrive in Washington State and their status be provided to Governor Inslee and Senator Murray's Offices.

7. They indicated that no one [indicated the CBP Congressional Affairs had no information] has been providing any information to the Washington State elected representatives, and when will information be provided?
- Currently, it has been reported that approximately 2500 protestors are in the Sea-Tac Airport main terminal, and anarchist have joined the protest. (b)(7)(E) groups have been activated and deployed to the airport.
 - CBP Seattle mustered all employees for safety and situational awareness. CBP Seattle has arranged a shuttle with the Port of Seattle to transportation employees via the tarmac to the employee parking garage.
 - For the next 24 hours 15 travelers have been identified that may be affected by the executive order breakdown below:

The Port of Seattle (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) called me and stated that Governor Jay Inslee was with her and requested to speak to me. Out of respect I took the call, the Governor wanted me to give him a briefing about the status of passengers that arrived today, what we expect for tomorrow and their classifications. I told the Governor that I could not provide him with the impact that we expect tomorrow, and we only encountered 5 passengers that may have been affected by the Executive Order. I told him that I could not provide him with specific about those passengers or their classifications. When pressed I told the Governor that the passengers for today could have fallen into one of the following categories non-immigrant B1/2 visitor, first time immigrant, legal permanent resident and/or all immigrant classes of admission. He asked if he was a legal permanent resident and a citizen of one the countries would he be subject of the executive order, and I responded yes. On January 27, 2017, President Donald Trump issued Executive Order: Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States. It is the policy of the United States to protect its citizens from foreign nationals who intend to commit terrorist attacks in the United States; and to prevent the admission of foreign nationals who intend to exploit United States immigration laws for malevolent purposes.

As we push forward in our efforts to protect our Nation, OFO Operations will require daily reporting on our activities as related to this Executive Order. Reporting will include encounters in the air, land and sea environments with anyone

who arrives into the U.S. from the seven (7) countries (Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen) that meets the criteria outlined in the Executive Order and the instructions issued to the field by Admissibility and Passenger Programs.

Using the attached spreadsheet, data should be captured daily for the 24-hour time period beginning at 0300 (EST) – and ending at 0259 hours (EST). By 0500 hours (EST) daily, each Field Office is required to submit their data from the previous 24-hours to OFO Field Liaison (b)(7)(E). Reports must be submitting using the attached Microsoft Excel template document. Field Liaison will consolidate these reports into a final report senior CBP and DHS leadership.

Executive Summary:

On January 28, 2017 two male passengers arriving aboard EK 227 were found inadmissible under the January 27th Presidential Executive Order. The passengers were allowed to withdraw their application for admission. Arrangement were made with Emirates Airlines to remove the passengers from the U.S. aboard EK 230, departing at 1700 hours the same day.

At approximately 1610 hours, CBP escorted the two passengers to their departure flight and they boarded the aircraft. While at the boarding gate, CBP was informed that the Port of Seattle was delaying the departure of the flight pending a decision by a Federal Judge on a petition filed by immigration attorneys on behalf of the two passengers preventing them from departing the U.S. At approximately 1745, Federal Judge Thomas Zilly approved the petition and both passengers were removed from the plane and returned to CBP Secondary. Both passengers were transported to the NWDC to await the outcome of the court hearing.

Details of the Incident / Date and Time:

- * On January 28, 2017, at 0612 hours, passengers (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) arrived aboard EK 227.
- * They were referred to Passport Hard Secondary because they matched the criteria outlined in the January 27th Presidential Executive Order.
- * Both were found inadmissible based on the order and were allowed to withdraw their applications for admission.
- * The passengers were identified as:

- * Arrangements were made with Emirates Airlines to remove the passengers on EK 230, departing a 1700 hours the same day.
- * At 1610 hours the passengers were escorted to the departure gate and boarding the aircraft.
- * At approximately 1700 hours, CBP was informed by the Port of Seattle that the flight departure would be delayed pending the decision of a Federal Judge concerning the departure of the two passengers.
- * At 1715 hours, ADFO (b)(6), (b)(7)(C); APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and AAPD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) briefed on the situation.
- * At 1745 hours, CBP was informed that the judge had granted the petition and that the two passengers were not to depart the U.S.
- * At 1805 hours, both passengers were removed from the aircraft and escorted back to CBP Secondary.

The group asked several specific questions regarding the travelers and if CBP has identified any additional travelers on future flights that will be the subject of the executive order. APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) told the group that information will be conveyed to them on the congressional call.

The following questions were asked and APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) informed the group that the questions will forwarded for an appropriate response.

1. Will local CBP honor the Federal Order granting the emergency motion for stay of removal of aliens?

2. Will the traveler that was returned earlier today be allowed to return immediately because of the Federal Order and stay in the U.S. until there is a ruling?
3. Where will the two that were just removed from the Emirates flight be housed until a ruling on the legal sufficiency of the Executive Order can be determined? Will they stay at Sea-Tac and if so, do you have the appropriate facilities here?
4. Northwest Immigrant Rights Project is the legal representative for the two travelers, and they gave CBP legal representation information and asked CBP to provide it to the travelers. In addition, they wanted to know when they can meet with their clients.
5. Will anyone else that arrives be allowed to stay in the Washington State until a ruling is made on the Executive Order?
6. Demanding the number of travelers expected to arrive in Washington State and their status be provided to Governor Inslee and Senator Murray's Offices.
7. They indicated that no one [indicated the CBP Congressional Affairs had no information] has been providing any information to the Washington State elected representatives, and when will information be provided?

· Currently, it has been reported that approximately 2500 protestors are in the Sea-Tac Airport main terminal, and anarchist have joined the protest. (b)(7)(E) groups have been activated and deployed to the airport.

· CBP Seattle mustered all employees for safety and situational awareness. CBP Seattle has arranged a shuttle with the Port of Seattle to transportation employees via the tarmac to the employee parking garage.

Area Port Directors – just want to update you on the latest guidance on how to process aliens who are subject to the Executive Order. Until further guidance is provided if you encounter a non-immigrant alien subject to the EO, you may consider requesting a waiver from C-1 through the DFO. The port will conduct a (b)(7)(E) (b)(7)(E) consideration for a waiver pursuant to Section 3(g) or 5(a) as appropriate. In considering a waiver you will need to consider if it is in the best interest of the U.S., not granting the waiver would cause an undue hardship or have significant compelling reasons. Examples could include returning students, seeking medical treatment in the U.S., not someone who wants to go to K-Mart for the sales.

If you are considering a waiver please contact the DFO or myself for guidance, I attached an example of the format that will be used to request the waiver. Once the DFO has concurred with the request she will coordinate with HQ to seek approval from C-1 which could take hours to minutes considering the time of day it was requested.

It appears that CBP is prepared to allow (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to enter the United States upon his entry at Sea-Tac airport, under the terms of his previously-issued visa. Furthermore, the CPB team is helpfully prepared to work with the airline carrier to ensure they are aware of (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) ability to enter the U.S., so that he is allowed to board his flight.

However, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) physical immigrant visa packet and visa were held in Seattle when he was sent back to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) on Saturday. My understanding is that he is not in possession of a passport, but was relying on these documents for entry and for travel. Furthermore, our understand is that his visa remains listed as "cancelled" in the State Department system. And, because of these things, and given the fact that he has to travel from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) before continuing on a flight to Seattle, there is a concern that he will not be allowed to board his flight(s), due to the airline or potentially in an issue with European customs in intra-Euro travel.

Can the CPB team assist (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and her client in getting in touch with the State Department to 1) revise his "cancelled" visa status, and 2) obtain a written document that will clearly indicate that his ability to travel from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to Seattle? Date of Report: February 4, 2017

Executive Summary:

On January 28, 2017 a male citizen of Somalia, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) arrived aboard (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) The passenger applied for admission as a first time immigrant. He was referred to hard secondary because he met the criteria for January 27th Presidential Executive Order. He was found inadmissible based on the Executive Order and was allowed to withdraw his application for admission. His immigrant visa package was retained by CBP and his Immigrant Visa was cancelled. He was returned to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) later that day on (b)(6), (b)(7)(C).

On February 3, 2017, in response to a District Court ruling enjoining the Executive Order, the Deputy Assistant Secretary (Edward Ramotowski) for the Department of State reversed the provisional revocation of all visa provisionally revoked on January 27, 2017.

On February 4, 2017, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) immigration attorney (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) contacted APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) seeking assistance in getting (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) back to the U.S. She indicated that (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was currently in (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and wished to return to the U.S. as an immigrant, however he is not in possession of a passport or an immigrant visa that would allow him to board a flight to the U.S. In an attempt to facilitate his return, CBP Seattle attempted to contact IAP (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to request assistance with boarding (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) on a Seattle bound flight. However, due to time difference, no officers were on duty. It was later determined that (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was actually in (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and that he would be boarding a flight there. CBP Seattle informed (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) that Seattle would process (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) if he could get to Seattle, however he would need to contact the Department of State (DOS) to obtain a boarding letter and visa. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) indicated that she understood that it wasn't a CBP issue and that she would be reaching out to Governor Inslee's office to get assistance in resolving the matter with the DOS so (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) could board the plane.

Details of the Incident / Date and Time:

- On January 27, 2014, Presidential Executive Order "Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States" enacted.
- On January 28, 2017 at 1035 hours, Somalia citizen, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) arrives aboard (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and applies for admission as a new immigrant.
- (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) is denied admission and allowed to withdraw his application for admission.
- At 1345 hours, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) is returned to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) aboard (b)(6), (b)(7)(C).
- On February 3, 2017 at approximately 1700 hours, a District Court rules issues a temporary restraining order suspending the Presidential Executive Order.

Section 3(c) of the Executive Order entitled "Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States" (Jan. 27, 2017) suspends for 90 days the entry into the United States of certain aliens from countries referred to in section 217(a)(12) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), 8 U.S.C. 1187(a)(12). Section 3(e) of the order directs the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of State, to submit to the President a list of countries recommended for inclusion on a Presidential proclamation that would prohibit the entry of certain foreign nationals from countries that do not provide information needed to adjudicate visas, admissions, or other benefits under the INA.

I understand that there has been reasonable uncertainty about whether those provisions apply to lawful permanent residents of the United States. Accordingly, to remove any confusion, I now clarify that Sections 3(c) and 3(e) do not apply to such individuals. Please immediately convey this interpretive guidance to all individuals responsible for the administration and implementation of the Executive Order.

Effective immediately, Canadian Landed Immigrants that are citizens of Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen with a valid U.S. Visa may be considered for an exemption of the 212(f) bar under Section 3(g) of the President's Executive Order if and only if the person satisfies the following conditions:

1. Proof to the satisfaction of the inspection Officer of person's Landed Immigrant Status in Canada;
2. Possession of a valid U.S. visa;
3. Travel that originates in Canada;
4. From only a pre-clearance airport; or
5. Applying for admission at a land border port of entry;
6. And the applicant is otherwise admissible.

The admission of such individuals must be in the national interest of the United States. Prior to any such admission, each individual must be subjected to a thorough examination by an immigration officer, to include CBP conduct of: (b)(7)(E)

Area Port Directors – just want to update you on the latest guidance on how to process aliens who are subject to the Executive Order. Until further guidance is provided if you encounter a non-immigrant alien subject to the EO, you may consider requesting a waiver from C-1 through the DFO. The port will conduct a (b)(7)(E) (b)(7)(E) consideration for a waiver pursuant to Section 3(g) or 5(a) as appropriate. In considering a waiver you will need to consider if it is in the best interest of the U.S., not granting the waiver would cause an undue hardship or have significant compelling reasons. Examples could include returning students, seeking medical treatment in the U.S., not someone who wants to go to K-Mart for the sales.

If you are considering a waiver please contact the DFO or myself for guidance, I attached an example of the format that will be used to request the waiver. Once the DFO has concurred with the request she will coordinate with HQ to seek approval from C-1 which could take hours to 30 minutes considering the time of day it was requested.

SUBJECT: Canadian Landed Immigrants and Executive Order "Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States"

Effective immediately, Canadian Landed Immigrants that are citizens of Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen with a valid U.S. Visa may be considered for an exemption of the 212(f) bar under Section 3(g) of the President's Executive Order if and only if the person satisfies the following conditions:

1. Proof to the satisfaction of the inspection Officer of person's Landed Immigrant Status in Canada;
2. Possession of a valid U.S. visa;
3. Travel that originates in Canada;
4. From only a pre-clearance airport; or
5. Applying for admission at a land border port of entry;
6. And the applicant is otherwise admissible.

The admission of such individuals must be in the national interest of the United States. Prior to any such admission, each individual must be subjected to a thorough examination by an immigration officer, to include CBP conduct of: (b)(7)(E)

Executive Order (EO) *Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States*

- On 27 January 2017, the President of the United States signed Executive Order (EO) *Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States*.
 - Effective immediately in accordance with the new EO, all immigrant and nonimmigrant persons of Iraq, Iran, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen are suspended entry into the U.S. for the next 90 days.
- The suspension does not affect foreign nationals traveling on diplomatic visas, NATO visas, C-2 visas for travel to the United Nations and G-1, G-2, G-3 and G-4.
- U.S. Lawful Permanent Residents (green card holders)
 - In accordance with White House Guidance issued on February 1, 2017, Sections 3(c) and 3(e) of Executive Order Entitled “Protecting the Nation from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States” do not apply to Lawful Permanent Residents.
- Dual citizens: EO applies to Dual Citizens, but travelers are being treated according to the travel document they present. For example, if they present a Canadian passport, that is how they are processed for entry.
- Someone who is in the Federal Inspection Area right now: Each person who may be admissible from one of the seven countries, has to have an individual waiver. Processing the waivers may delay the release of the individual.
- What about refugees who are considered to be “in transit?”
 - There are currently 872 refugees who are considered to be in transit who are scheduled to arrive in the United States this week. The Secretaries of State and DHS have coordinated and will process the 872 individuals consistent with the terms of the Executive Order, which we’ve operationalized by assessing each traveler on a case-by-case basis.
- Documents that can be used by citizens identified by the EO to enter the United States are:
 - Any diplomatic visa (A, G, C-2, or NATO)
 - An I-551 (Green Card)
 - An advance parole document
 - Any SQ immigrant visa

If they are not in possession of one of the above travel documents, they will not be allowed to enter the U.S.

It appears that CBP is prepared to allow (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to enter the United States upon his entry at Sea-Tac airport, under the terms of his previously-issued visa. Furthermore, the CPB team is helpfully prepared to work with the airline carrier to ensure they are aware of (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) ability to enter the U.S., so that he is allowed to board his flight.

However, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) physical immigrant visa packet and visa were held in Seattle when he was sent back to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) on Saturday. My understanding is that he is not in possession of a passport, but was relying on these documents for entry and for travel. Furthermore, our understand is that his visa remains listed as "cancelled" in the State Department system. It appears that CBP is prepared to allow (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to enter the United States upon his entry at Sea-Tac airport, under the terms of his previously-issued visa. Furthermore, the CPB team is helpfully prepared to work with the airline carrier to ensure they are aware of (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) ability to enter the U.S., so that he is allowed to board his flight.

However, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) physical immigrant visa packet and visa were held in Seattle when he was sent back to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) on Saturday. My understanding is that he is not in possession of a passport, but was relying on these documents for entry and for travel. Furthermore, our understand is that his visa remains listed as "cancelled" in the State Department system. And, because of these things, and given the fact that he has to travel from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) before continuing on a flight to Seattle, there is a concern that he will not be allowed to board his flight(s), due to the airline or potentially in an issue with European customs in intra-Euro travel.

Can the CPB team assist (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and her client in getting in touch with the State Department to 1) revise his "cancelled" visa status, and 2) obtain a written document that will clearly indicate that his ability to travel from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to Seattle? Again, we appreciate your willingness to communicate directly with the carrier, as well. That will also be important, but (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and her client are worried it will be insufficient.

Executive Summary:

On January 28, 2017 a male citizen of Somalia (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) arrived aboard (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). The passenger applied for admission as a first time immigrant. He was referred to hard secondary because he met the criteria for January 27th Presidential Executive Order. He was found inadmissible based on the Executive Order and was allowed to withdraw his application for admission. His immigrant visa package was retained by CBP and his Immigrant Visa was cancelled. He was returned to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) later that day on (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)

On February 3, 2017, in response to a District Court ruling enjoining the Executive Order, the Deputy Assistant Secretary (Edward Ramotowski) for the Department of State reversed the provisional revocation of all visa provisionally revoked on January 27, 2017.

On February 4, 2017, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) immigration attorney, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) contacted APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) seeking assistance in getting (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) back to the U.S. She indicated that (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was currently in London and wished to return to the U.S. as an immigrant, however he is not in possession of a passport or an immigrant visa that would allow him to board a flight to the U.S. In an attempt to facilitate his return, CBP Seattle attempted to contact IAP (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to request assistance with boarding (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) on a Seattle bound flight. However, due to time difference, no officers were on duty. It was later determined that (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was actually in (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and that he would be boarding a flight there. CBP Seattle informed (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) that Seattle would process (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) if he could get to Seattle, however he would need to contact the Department of State

(DOS) to obtain a boarding letter and visa. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) indicated that she understood that it wasn't a CBP issue and that she would be reaching out to Governor Inslee's office to get assistance in resolving the matter with the DOS so (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) could board the plane.

- * On February 4, 2017, at 1150 hours, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) contacted APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) by email, seeking assistance with getting (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) back to the U.S.
- * At 1210 hours, APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) contacted (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to help coordinate (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) return.
- * At 1227 hours, multiple attempts to contact IAP (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) were made, but were unsuccessful.

Until further guidance is provided if you encounter a non-immigrant alien subject to the EO, you may consider requesting a waiver from C-1 through the DFO. The port will conduct a **(b)(7)(E)** **(b)(7)(E)** consideration for a waiver pursuant to Section 3(g) or 5(a) as appropriate. In considering

a waiver you will need to consider if it is in the best interest of the U.S., not granting the waiver would cause an undue hardship or have significant compelling reasons. Examples could include returning students, seeking medical treatment in the U.S., not someone who wants to go to K-Mart for the sales.

If you are considering a waiver please contact the DFO or myself for guidance, I attached an example of the format that will be used to request the waiver. Once the DFO has concurred with the request she will coordinate with HQ to seek approval from C-1 which could take hours to minutes considering the time of day it was requested.

Area Port Directors – just want to update you on the latest guidance on how to process aliens who are subject to the Executive Order. Until further guidance is provided if you encounter a non-immigrant alien subject to the EO, you may consider requesting a waiver from C-1 through the DFO. The port will conduct a (b)(7)(E) (b)(7)(E) consideration for a waiver pursuant to Section 3(g) or 5(a) as appropriate. In considering a waiver you will need to consider if it is in the best interest of the U.S., not granting the waiver would cause an undue hardship or have significant compelling reasons. Examples could include returning students, seeking medical treatment in the U.S., not someone who wants to go to K-Mart for the sales.

If you are considering a waiver please contact the DFO or myself for guidance, I attached an example of the format that will be used to request the waiver. Once the DFO has concurred with the request she will coordinate with HQ to seek approval from C-1 which could take hours to minutes considering the time of day it was requested.

Please continue to send your 3 times a day matrix on time and ensure they are sent to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and myself.



I responded to his email by informing him that Seattle CBP is willing to assist as much as possible to process the (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) without any unnecessary delays upon his arrival, however, our local ability to contact the State Department and airline overseas (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) is out of our immediate abilities. We will be elevating this situation up through our chain of command to Washington, DC, and possibly a CBP office at the Headquarters level could facilitate what you have outlined with the State Department- the reissuance of the visa and/or provide a travel letter for (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) since he does not have a passport and visa.

We sent bullets to your attention, and is it possible for you to ask or point out that HQ may need to assist in coordinating some of these action with the Department of State.

It appears that CBP is prepared to allow (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to enter the United States upon his entry at Sea-Tac airport, under the terms of his previously-issued visa. Furthermore, the CPB team is helpfully prepared to work with the airline carrier to ensure they are aware of (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) ability to enter the U.S., so that he is allowed to board his flight.

However, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) physical immigrant visa packet and visa were held in Seattle when he was sent back to Vienna, on Saturday. My understanding is that he is not in possession of a passport, but was relying on these documents for entry and for travel. Furthermore, our understand is that his visa remains listed as “cancelled” in the State Department system. And, because of these things, and given the fact that he has to travel from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) before continuing on a flight to Seattle, there is a concern that he will not be allowed to board his flight(s), due to the airline or potentially in an issue with European customs in intra-Euro travel.

Can the CPB team assist (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and her client in getting in touch with the State Department to 1) revise his “cancelled” visa status, and 2) obtain a written document that will clearly indicate that his ability to travel from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to Seattle? Again, we appreciate your willingness to communicate directly with the carrier, as well. That will also be important, but (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and her client are worried it will be insufficient.

On February 3, 2017, in response to a District Court ruling enjoining the Executive Order, the Deputy Assistant Secretary (Edward Ramotowski) for the Department of State reversed the provisional revocation of all visa provisionally revoked on January 27, 2017.

On February 4, 2017, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) immigration attorney, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) contacted APD (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) seeking assistance in getting (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) back to the U.S. She indicated that (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was currently in (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and wished to return to the U.S. as an immigrant, however he is not in possession of a passport or an immigrant visa that would allow him to board a flight to the U.S. In an attempt to facilitate his return, CBP Seattle attempted to contact IAP (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to request assistance with boarding (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) on a Seattle bound flight. However, due to time difference, no officers were on duty. It was later determined that (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was actually in (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and that he would be boarding a flight there. CBP Seattle informed (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) that Seattle would process (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) if he could get to Seattle, however he would need to contact the Department of State (DOS) to obtain a boarding letter and visa. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) indicated that she understood that it wasn't a CBP issue and that she would be reaching out to Governor Inslee's office to get assistance in resolving the matter with the DOS so (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) could board the plane.

It appears that CBP is prepared to allow (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to enter the United States upon his entry at Sea-Tac airport, under the terms of his previously-issued visa. Furthermore, the CPB team is helpfully prepared to work with the airline carrier to ensure they are aware of (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) ability to enter the U.S., so that he is allowed to board his flight.

However, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) physical immigrant visa packet and visa were held in Seattle when he was sent back to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) on Saturday. My understanding is that he is not in possession of a passport, but was relying on these documents for entry and for travel. Furthermore, our understand is that his visa remains listed as "cancelled" in the State Department system. And, because of these things, and given the fact that he has to travel from (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) before continuing on a flight to Seattle, there is a concern that he will not be allowed to board his flight(s), due to the airline or potentially in an issue with European customs in intra-Euro travel.
